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

Preface

It has indeed been a pleasure for me to work as the Principal of this reputed college which was started by Late Bapuraoji Deshmukh who was an ardent disciple of Gandhiji and had strong commitment for the welfare of the rural masses. He established 'Yeshwant Gramin Shikshan Sanstha' in the year 1959 under the aegis of which our institution was started in 1960, and the UGC recognized the institution under 2(f), 12(b) in 1971. Since then, the institution has been imparting education to the students coming mostly from the surrounding villages. In 2001, our Society won 'The Best Education Society Award' from the Govt. of Maharashtra. The college also won second prize of Rs. 50,000/- cash from Government of Maharashtra in the session 2014-15 for Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan. The college has a strength of 2871 students. The Senior college has strength of 1920 students, while the Junior college has 951 students. This year, six of our students from Junior college have cleared JEEE and four students have received Kishore Vaigyanik Scholarship. Two of our senior college NCC candidates have represented the National Republic Parade. Three students of Post Graduation in English have cleared SET examination. One of our teaching staff members, Dr. R.K. Mor, has been offered the Raman Post Doctoral Research Fellowship by U.G.C. He is planning to complete his Post **Doctoral research in USA**. The college celebrated its **Golden Jubilee** in 2010-11 wherein several functions were held to commemorate the event. Vidharbha Marathi Sahitya Sammelan was held in the college wherein several literary figures had participated. It was a great moment for the college and the education society. Recently, the birth anniversary of our Founder Chairman Late Bapuraoji Deshmukh was celebrated by instituting a Lecture Series in his name Prof. Arun Gujrathi, the Ex-speaker of Mahrashtra Legislative Assembly, delivered the first lecture of the series on topic "Democracy in past, present and future" on 9th May 2016.

Our college runs B.A., B.Sc.(Home Science), LL.B. 3 year and 5 year Degree course, M.A. in seven disciplines, LL.M. in six disciplines and M.Sc. in Textile and Clothing. It is a **Centre for Higher Learning and Reasearch** in four subjects. The college also has a **Yeshwantrao Chavhan Maharashtra Open University centre** which has strength of 600 students. The college has a huge central library with more than **1,00,000** books, magazines, journals which effectively cater to the needs of students and faculty. The laboratories are well - equipped with the latest instruments. The college provides many facilities such as interactive boards, L.C.D.s, O.H.P., projectors, computers, audio-visual aids, etc. ensuring the students to have an effective learning experience. The institution encourages the faculty to attend seminars/conferences/ workshops/refresher courses so as to update their knowledge in respective disciplines. The college also has a medical health centre wherein the fitness of the students is taken care of.

The institution has organized State level and National level seminars on different subjects. Recently, the Internal Quality Assurance Cell of our college had organized a NAAC sponsored two day National Seminar on the subject "The Need for College Academic and Administrative Audit". The seminar was well attended and appreciated. This seminar was followed by a workshop for the Wardha District farmers. The workshop was on Sericulture and Bee-Keeping. The logic behind it, was to give a second option to the farmers so as to make them financially sound in order to reduce the suicidal rates in Vidharbha. The research committee in the institution facilitates and monitors research activities. R.T.M. Nagpur University has given the college a status of Centre for Research and Higher Learning in five subjects namely History, Political Science, Law, Textile and Clothing and Psychology. The Ph.D aspirants can enroll themselves with the college to complete their Ph.D. programmes. 17 faculties out of 34 are Ph.Ds, 5 faculty members have submitted their theses and others are in the process of

completing. Till now, the faculty has completed 1 major research project and 14 minor research projects. The college has a staff club which was set up in 1968 to cater to the academic needs of the faculty. Every week, there is a paper reading session where academic discussions take place. Last year the college has run a sixty hour course work on Research Methodology for the students enrolled for doctoral programmes. The college is committed to run such courses every year in future. Many extension activities are carried out by the college to contribute to the community development. The college has **adopted** a village named Karanji Bhoge which is 10 kilometers away from the campus. The NSS students and teachers visit the village to identify and ameliorate the problems of the villagers. The college has a huge auditorium that can accommodate 1000 students and a seminar hall with a capacity of 120 delegates.

The enrolled students are entitled to get GOI scholarships from Central and State Governments. But apart from these scholarships, the teaching and non-teaching staff has created a corpus fund through which Yeshwant Scholarship is given to the meritorious students irrespective of caste, religion and the financial status of the parents. This scholarship acts as a motivational force for the students to do better and better. The college has a rich alumni who are today working in different walks of life. The NAAC Peer Team visited the college for the first time in 2004 and the college was awarded with B++ grade. The reaccreditation was done in 2010 and the college was awarded 'B' grade with CGPA of 2.69 on the four point scale. The college has always strived to nurture and sustain academic atmosphere in the premises. With the global challenges coming in, the very system of education is going through a metamorphosis; however we are committed to our goals and the mission. The college has a vision to provide excellent academic orientation to the learners coming from rural masses and would stand by it even in future. It is committed to foster scientific, rational, humanitarian and democratic outlook among the learners. We shall keep on doing our best to realize the vision envisaged by our founders.

Executive Summary

Our institution was established by 'Yeshwant Gramin Shikshan Sanstha' by Late Bapuraoji Deshmukh, an ardent disciple of Gandhiji in the year 1960 with a vision to provide excellent academic orientation to the learners coming from the rural areas,. The society has 22 schools, 10 Junior colleges, 4 Senior colleges and 1 Engineering college catering to the needs of rural masses. His contribution towards co-operative sector is also commendable. At present Prof. Sureshbhau Deshmukh, Ex-MLA, Wardha, is the chairman of the society.

The management is committed to the academic development of the institution and extends every support from time to time to maintain high academic standards. The teachers have full freedom to express their ideas and if found worthy, they are implemented. The institution has always strived to develop into a centre for excellence.

Criterion I:- Curricular Aspects

The college is affiliated to RTM Nagpur University and it is the job of the university to frame the curriculum of different programmes. The curriculum and the syllabi are prepared by the respective Boards of Studies. The initiative and contribution in this field by our faculty is commendable. In 2005-2010, we had 9 faculties as members of Boards of Studies, 5 members to the Faculty, 2 chairpersons of BOS, one Dean, 3 Faculty members on the Senate and one was an executive council member. In 2010-2015 we had 9 faculties as members of BOS, 3 as Faculty members, 2 Chairpersons and Academic Council members, 2 members on Senate and one Management Council member. One of our staff members Dr. A. G. Pawade is the Chairman of the Disciplinary Action Committee of RTM Nagpur University, Nagpur. All the members on the respective boards / committees have made valuable contributions to the design and framing of curriculum and syllabi. The teachers who did not have representation on the Boards have sent their suggestions to the university; either directly or through workshops so as to incorporate their ideas in the curriculum. The syllabi of all the subjects have been framed in unison with the UGC guidelines; and the curriculum is framed / changed after every four years.

Criterion II: Teaching –Learning Evaluation

Total transparency is maintained in the process of admission. It also encourages equity. If the number of applicants are less than the sanctioned seats, the principle of 'First come, First Serve' is followed. If the applicants are more than the sanctioned seats, merit-wise lists are prepared and displayed on the notice board. The category wise reservation is taken care of. Generally, all the students are accommodated for their desired courses. As the students come from a similar educational background, there is harmony in their knowledge base. However, slow and advanced learners are identified by the respective teachers. Slow/weak learners are advised to attend Remedial / Tutorial classes in small clusters. They are also given notes so as to facilitate them. The advanced learners are given suggestions to do extra reading so as to enhance their domain of knowledge. It is our cardinal principle to use teaching aids and make use of ICT so as to make the teaching process more interesting and absorbing. The plays and movies are made available to the students; and the teachers go on to make an analysis of the play resulting into a better understanding. The students are encouraged to give their feedback on the teaching of the faculty. Seventeen out of thirty four teaching staff has the research qualification, Five have submitted their thesis for the award of Ph.D. degree and thus have contributed much to the domain of knowledge. The management encourages the faculty to attend seminars, conferences, workshops so as to enhance their academic skills. encouragement from the management has motivated more and more faculty members to go for their doctoral research. The library is totally computerized, and has internet, LAN, INFLIBNET facilities which enable a student or a faculty member to go through any peer journal or magazine on line. The Library also provides facilities like MOPAC, SMS Alert and Institutional Repository to the users. The internet facility is a blessing to the aspiring scholars.

Criterion III:- Research, Consultancy and Extension

The faculty of the college is actively engaged in research. Twelve of our teachers are Ph.D. supervisors. Many of our faculty members have completed their minor and major research projects that were sponsored by the UGC. We are proud of the fact that most of our teachers are actively busy in research and extension activities. Some of our teachers are busy offering consultancy to govt. and non govt. organizations. Some of our faculty members have authored books and published research papers in seminars and conferences. Several of them have worked as resource persons for seminars, conferences, refresher and orientation courses in spite of the fact that they live away from Nagpur. Several of our teachers are committed to extension activities. Some of them work for NGO's. Teaching in schools is a regular feature. They also visit social organizations to promote social welfare and youth building. The college also has strong NSS and NCC units. Camps are arranged in villages and the students are busy in working for the upliftment of the villagers. The college NSS unit has adopted one of the nearby villages so as to identify and ameliorate their problems. The focus of our extension activities is the common man. We are also committed to 'Swaccha Bharat Abhiyaan' and have organized different programmes in this regard. Extension programmes in Legal Aid, Community Development, Community Hygiene, Blood Donation and Sickle Cell Camps, Child Development, Teaching programmes, Sudarshan Kriya, Women Welfare, Adult Education, Dowry and Aids Awareness, importance of Breast feeding, etc. are organized by the college at different places.

Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has an adequate infrastructure for curricular and extracurricular activities. The college has spacious well-furnished class-rooms with interactive boards attached. The wellequipped laboratories are in consonance with the syllabi prescribed to the students. The college has a computer lab with 22 computers. The college has in total 104 computers, 10 laptops that have been given to the Heads of the Departments. The college has a rich library accommodating more than 1,00,000 books and Journals. The library has been totally computerized with internet facility and it makes use of INFLIBNET. It also has e-library having 54 latest computers with Multimedia, Interactive Board, LCD Projector and supported by a complete power backup. The college premise is under CCTV surveillance. One of the corners of the library is reserved for the books and Journals for the competitive examination like M.P.S.C., U.P.S.C. and Banking examinations. Two years back, there has been extension of the library and has facilitated us to accommodate more books. The students and the teachers have separate reading rooms. A separate unit is maintained for the legal books. We have several Judges and advocates visiting the library for legal references. The library is also connected with a language lab where college has installed Oral software with a module of 20+1 in order to improve the language skills of the students. Plays and films are shown and discussed among the students in the language lab. The college also has audio-visual aids such as OHP, LCD projectors, TV, etc. to benefit the students. Optimum use of infrastructure is made for teaching and extra-curricular activities. The college has acoustic seminar hall where seminars and conferences take place. It has an auditorium with a capacity of 1000 students. The college also has Boys and Girls hostel, but as there are better transport facilities, students prefer to commute from their villages rather than stay in the hostel. The college has a Yeshwantrao Chavhan Maharashtra Open University centre which has strength of 600

students. The classes of this centre take place on Sunday. Consultancy services are rendered by different departments. Legal aid camps and Moot courts are organized by the Law department. Psychology department offers consultancy to students and parents. English and Marathi departments help the government organization to set question papers and evaluate them. The college has a huge playground that comprises of a Basket Ball ground created according to the **International standards**; It also has facilities for indoor games. It has Football, Hockey, Badminton, Ball Badminton grounds. Right in the front part of the college there is a well maintained garden with a statue of our founder chairman Late Bapuraoji Deshmukh.

Criterion V: Students Support and Progression

Detailed information regarding tuition fees, admission procedure, scholarships, academic calendar and the facilities provided by the college is mentioned in the prospectus. Apart from different scholarships / freeships given by the Central and State government, the college has instituted 'Yeshwant Scholarship' of Rs. 2000/- annually for meritorious and deserving students. There is an annual medical checkup of every student. Medical assistance is provided in the campus to the needy students. Generally, the students have problems in coping with English; hence Remedial coaching classes are arranged for the weaker sections. Extracurricular activities are promoted in the college, so as to develop the latent talents. Students participating in Games and Sports are provided with sports uniforms and kits. The college runs classes for entry in services like MPSC, UPSC and NET/SET. Distinguished personalities are invited to give guidance to students. College teams often participate in inter university competitions and have won several laurels. Though we do not have coaching classes for TOFEL / IELTS the college has purchased CDs and DVDs required for the examination. The college publishes annual magazine and wall magazines / posters to give scope to the students to express their ideas, views freely and frankly. The college also has a mechanism for anti ragging, anti -sexual harassment Redressal; and grievance Redressal cell. Every year students' council is elected to organize different programmes and activities of the college. As it is not a professional college, the students generally aspire for the government jobs; and the multi-national or private companies are reluctant in conducting campus interviews. The suggestions and the feedback from the students have given us scope to develop the institute.

Criterion VI: Governance and Leadership

The nearby villages are the catchment areas for our admission and hence the college has a vision to provide excellent academic orientation to the learners coming from rural areas. We have a mission to develop the competency skills of learners in their chosen areas of learning. The college has a logo of Lotus with a Upanishada mantra ' asato ma sadagamaya' which means 'Lead me from fraud and deception to a life based on truthfulness'; and as the last line reads 'Guide and assist me to achieve great legacies for future'. Keeping in view the above fact, the institute endeavours to foster scientific, rational, humanitarian and a democratic outlook among its students. As per the vision, the college is committed in its quest for excellence. The Local Management Committee takes stock of the grievances /suggestions of the students and staff, proposes development and welfare programmes, monitors the students' progression and is committed to help the institute in every possible manner. The management also felicitates students attaining meritorious positions and teachers acquiring higher qualifications such as Ph.D. or proficiency / distinction in the related fields through staff club programmes; thus promoting the teachers and students to have a quest for excellance. The LMC also considers the feedbacks received from the students for better governance. management is committed to provide optimum services to the students and teachers by

monitoring the financial resources. All the stakeholders are involved in the developmental activities of the college to ensure the smooth running of the institution. There is decentralization of work through the heads of the departments and the heads of different committees. The college had set up IQAC on 24.07.2006 and has provided all facilities and amenities to the cell. It is the job of the IQAC Co-Ordinator and the Principal to monitor the progress of staff and students and ensure the smooth running of the institute.

Criterion VII: Innovations and Best Practices

The college is committed to provide an eco-friendly and beautiful ambience to the premises. In the front part of the premises, we have a lawn and a lush green garden of around 10,000 square feet. The campus also has **163 green trees** all around. Care has been taken to see that the campus is studded with flower plants giving out aroma and essence. There is facility for water harvesting and decomposing of the waste material.

Three years back, the college has instituted 'Yeshwant Scholarship' for the meritorious students irrespective of caste/creed. The scholarship is given to the students acquiring 60% or more marks. Teaching and Non-teaching staff of the college has contributed to make this practice feasible. A fund to the tune of Rs.3 lakhs is annually contributed by the staff and disbursed among the students. The practice has helped us to attract meritorious students. It has also resulted into more admissions. Moreover, it has motivated the students to be sincere and honest. The college has a staff club whose one of the activities is to make one of the teachers read his research/informative paper every week. A healthy discussion ensues after the paper. This ultimately has helped our staff members to present more and more research papers/articles at national and international seminars and conferences. We have been able to develop research inclination among teachers through such a practice. The college also makes use of street plays for bringing awareness and awakening among the community / society. The college organizes different street plays on subjects like dowry system, aids awareness, family planning, superstitions, addiction, etc. in different localities of the district, focussing on the evils. This has helped in ameliorating the social evils such as superstition, dowry system, etc. from the society. Such best practices can certainly root out evils from the society and promote a healthy atmosphere.

DEPARTMENT OF MARATHI

The Marathi Department began in the college in 1960. Though Marathi is the mother tongue of most of the students, the department decided to keep Marathi Literature as an optional subject so as to acquaint them with different facets of literature. Dr.V.G Kawale, a well known literary figure, joined as the Head of the Department since the inception of the college. He was followed by Shri T. G. Mane. He then came to be assisted by Prof. Dr. Yogendra Meshram, a well known Dalit writer who presided over the VIII Ambedkar Literary Conference held in 2006. He had written novels and edited a quarterly magazine □Lokanukampa□. In 1988, Dr. Manoj Tayade joined as a faculty. He served here for a short period and later on became the Professor and Head of the department of Marathi at Sant Gadgebaba Amravati University, Amravati.

At present, Dr. N. H. Khode is the Head of the Department. He has published two books on Folk Literature and has completed a minor research project on the subject □Literary and Cultural Study of Thanjavur□. Prof. P. M. Narayane is also a faculty member who has published several research papers in different journals.

The department organises several activities such as poetry competition, calligraphy competition, essay writing competition, etc. Seminars and conferences are also organized by the department, wherein the literary figures are invited so as to bring out the latent talents of the students. The department has produced several meritorious students at postgraduation. Twelve students have passed their NET/SET examinations. The department organised (i) A one-day seminar on the subject □Loksahitya va Lalitsahitya yancha Paraspar Sambandha□ in 2008, (ii) A workshop on □Literature and creative writing□ in 2009, (iii) Vidarbha Sahitya Sangache Adhiveshan on 28, 29, 30 January, 2011 and (iv) Marathi Pradhyapak Parishadeche Adhiveshan on 18, 19 January, 2013. The department organizes trips to places like Sewagram and Pawanar ashrams in order to inspire the students and instil confidence in them.

Lectures of great dignitaries such as Dr. Nirmalkumar Fadkule, Dr. Vitthal Wagh, Dr. Yeshwant Manohar, Shri Mahadeoraoji Bhuibhar, Shri Shyam Petkar, a playwright, Dr. Ashok Chopade, Shri Gajendra Surkar, Prashant Deshmukh, Sanjay Ingale Tigaonkar, Dr. Anant Khedkar have been organized. The department aims at arousing curiosity and instilling confidence among the students.

DEPARTMENT OF HINDI

The Department was established in the year, 1961. Compulsory Hindi & Hindi Literature are taught in the department. The main objective of the department is to create love and trust for the national language by bringing about suitable linguistic changes and making the students capable to qualify state and national level competitive examinations. As the language has a significant place in the life of an individual, society and nation, all the students of the college have to be made proficient in the four skills of the language so as to enable them to speak fluently and write lucidly.

The department of Hindi has ever been on its path to progress. Prof. Smt. S. R. Baindur was the Head of the Department since the inception of the college. She taught the students with all the simplicity by giving several examples and anecdotes from Hindu mythology.

Thereafter, Dr. Anil Dube became the Head of the Department. After working for a few years, he decided to join as an Assistant Professor in Mahatma Gandhi Hindi International University, Wardha. Later on, Dr. Sanjay Dhote was appointed as an Asstistant Professor in the department. He had worked as a Project Fellow in Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University,

and has a doctoral research degree on the topic "Hindi Poetry of Rashtrasant Tukdoji Maharaj". The department stresses on the study of language and literature, translation and transcription. These studies have become job-oriented; and hence the department tries to impart lessons even in these studies. The department organizes programmes like Hindi Day, Hindi Week, Hindi Workshops, Hindi Debate Competition, Calligraphy Competition, wall Magazines, etc. Apart from this, the department celebrates birth/death anniversaries of luminaries to make the students realize our cultural heritage. The department has thousands of books and journals housed in the college library. The department plans to run a short–term course in advertisement and conduct a workshop on translation studies in future.

DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH

Department of English came into being since the inception of the college in 1960. Since then, this department has been adding coloured feathers in the cap of the college. The college being a premier institute in the district of Wardha, it ushered in a sort of a renaissance in the district and many students got exposure to higher studies.

The former professors of this department were a galaxy of eminent luminaries who are remembered with great respect even today. Prof. Somalwar, Dr. S.C. Varma and Dr. Jayant Paranjape were the great literary figures who later on joined the university postgraduate department. Prof. Zafar Khan, an ex-faculty, went to Nigeria as a professor of English and joined a government college over there. Dr. Janyat Paranjape was honoured with D.Lit. degree by Nagpur University in recognition to his critical book 'Obscurity in Grace's (Prof. Manik Godghate) Poetry'. Postgraduate teaching in this department began in the academic session 1994-95 on no-grant basis. Dr. Jayant Wagh, a physician (1997), Miss Lillama Joseph, Miss Deshmukh and Miss Beena Samuel (2004), Miss Kavita Chandankhede (2005), Babu Sebastian (2006) who brought laurels to the college by securing positions in the university merit list. Miss Lillama Joseph secured four Gold Medals by standing first in the order of merit. Right now Babu Sebastian is away in Rome serving as a visiting faculty to two universities in Rome. Miss Sarita Bharadwaj scored 75.25% marks in the university exam of summer 2015.

There are many alumni of this department who have passed NET & SET exams. and are presently working as professors of English in various colleges. The long list includes the names of Miss Mendhe, Krishna Dixit, Miss Kavita Chandanlhede, Mr. Nitin Ghamandi, Mr. Pramod Dhengale, Mr. Anil Andel, etc. Two of our students namely Shri Sudhir Pakhale and Shri Fulkar passed the SET examination conducted in September 2015.

Presently, there are three faculties and a contributory lecturer imparting education to the students. Two of our faculty members have been awarded Ph.D. and are the approved Ph.D. supervisors of R.T.M. Nagpur University, Nagpur. The third faculty member is M.Phil in English. We have English Language Lab & English Literary Association. Prof. Dr. U.B. Parekar, Head of the Department of English, is on the Advisory Board of Annual Research Journal 'Explorations' published by GC University, Lahore, Pakistan. Prof. Dr. V.B. Dhone worked as a member to the Senate, Faculty of Arts and the Board of Studies in English. He was also the member of Board of Studies in English at Maharashtra State Secondary and Higher Secondary Education Pune. He was instrumental in preparing textbooks for compulsory English from IX to XII. He also prepared textbooks on English Literature for XI and XII standards. His book entitled Essays of Angelo has been prescribed by the University. He is also a recipient of the prestigious Dakshina Fellowship. Dr. V.B. Dhone is on the Editorial Board of three Research Journals. Recently, he has been elected as the Vice-President of Maharashtra Federation of University and College Teachers' organization for the third time and is also Secretary of Nagpur University Teachers' Association. Prof. S.M. Khan and Prof. Madhuri Sidam are also the faculty of the Department.

The department had organized a UGC Sponsored National Seminar on the topic "Teaching of English Language: Problems and Remedies" in the year 2009. The eminent scholars such as Dr. Sudhakar Marathe, Dr. Shrish Chindhade, Dr. Madhu Kamra, Principal M.N. Kadepurkar, Prof. Zafar Khan, Dr. Prantik Banerjee enlightened the delegates on various issues related to the seminar topic. The seminar was a grand success in the sense that 110 professors from the vicinity and long off places had registered their presence. As many as 45 delegates presented their papers.

From the session 2017-18, a four-week certificate course in Tourism will be started in collaboration with the departments of Geography, Law and History,

The present faculties of the department are rendering their services for perpetuation of the glorious tradition set by the former scholarly professors of the department.

DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMICS

The Department of Economics was established in 1960 with the very inception of the college. The P.G. course was started in 1978 on non-grant basis. Dr. M. L. Kasare was the Head of the Department from 1960 to 1997. Dr. M.L. Kasare has the distinction of representing several National level committees. He was a member of steering committee of Planning Commission and was an approved Research guide of Nagpur University, Nagpur. He was also the Director of 'Buddha Adhyayan Peeth' at Mahatma Gandhi International Hindi University, Wardha. Prof. B. J. Hadke and Dr. R. G. Bhoyar, the ex-faculty members, went on to become the Principals of the sister institutes. Shri. P. M. Khotele was an acclaimed academician and Research Guide. Shri G. K. Bhagat and Shri V. L. Dhoke also worked as faculty members for a short period. At present Dr. Asha Agnihotri is the Head of the Department. She has a number of publications to her credit. She is assisted by Prof. Sandeep Chavhan and two contributory teachers. Many ex-students of the department have excelled in their fields and occupy coveted posts of Principals and Professors. Some of them have passed the Staff Selection Commission or other competitive examinations. One of them at present is the Member of Legislative Assembly of Wardha. Several of our students have appeared in the orders of merit in theri postgraduation exams. As many as twelve students have appeared in the merit list during last five years. Shri Sharad Khobragade and Shri. Sumedh Dhanvij was first in order of merit and bagged gold medals respectively in 2007 and 2011.

The aim of the department is to make an all-round development of the students. In order to achieve this aim the department organises seminars, conferences, group discussions, etc. LCDs and PPTs are used while giving instructions. The students are also given adequate guidance about NET/SET and other competitive examinations. The central library has more than 5900 books of Economics, which facilitates the students to prepare for NET/SET examinations.

DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY

The Department of History began with the inception of the college in 1960 and the PG Department was started during the academic session 1971-72. The courses taught in the department are wide-ranging, designed to educate and enlighten the postgraduate students not only with information but also to impart useful lessons. The focus of the teaching is on making History instructive. The department makes an attempt to assess lessons of History which could be turned into highly advantageous experience in the life of students. With these objectives in view, the department conducts field trips and links classroom teaching to factual historical sites such as Sewagram, Pawnar, Anandwan, Bhadravati, Ramtek, etc.

The Method of instruction aims at developing ability among the students so as to make them courageous and confident. The programme does not only burden the students with formal lectures, but is also supplemented by extracurricular activities such as Seminars, Debates,

Elocution, Symposium, Group Discussions, Educational Tours, Guest Lectures and celebrations of Birth/Death anniversaries of luminaries.

The department had such a glorious faculty such as Shri G.B. Kadam who went on to become the Principal of the college and then Vice Chancellor of Nagpur University. He was also a member of Maharashtra Public Service Commission. Shri G. B. Kadam was assisted by Dr. Deopujari, and Shri. M. S. Deshmukh who later on became the Principal of Yeshwant Mahvidyalaya, Seloo. Dr. Sheikh Shabbir was also an ex-faculty member who later on joined as a reader in Visweraya Regional College of Engineering, Nagpur. Dr. G. K. Mane, who had worked as a Historian in the Archaeological Institute, Hyderabad, joined this college as a lecturer. Dr. R. V. Ingle and Shri. B. N. Choudhari were the great teachers of the subject and worked with all their humility and sincerity.

At present, Porf. P. D. Khobragade is the Head of the Department, and he is assisted by Dr. V. G. Bais and Prof. N. D. Kawade. Dr. Bais is a research guide under whom six candidates have been awarded Ph.Ds. He has published four books and several research papers in national and international journals.

From the year 2010 to 2014, ten students have appeared in the university merit list. Shri Satish Purushottam Mandhare came first in the order of merit and won 11 gold medals. Prof. P. D. Khobragade, Prof. Dr. V. G. Bais and Prof. N.D. Kawade are approved P.G. Teachers. Nagpur University has approved the department as a Place for Higher Learning and Research.

Every year, the department constitutes Itihas Adhyayan Mandal which is purely a body of students' activities. The body aims to promote the habit of independent thinking among the students so as to develop a balanced integrated personality. The Department has conducted a regional seminar on 'The Role of Vidharbha in Freedom Movement of India:1920 - 1947'.

From the next session, the department has decided to initiate, in collaboration with the departments of Geography, Law and English, a four-week certificate course in Tourism.

DEPARTMENT OF POLITICAL SCIENCE

Political Science Department was established in the year 1960 & the Postgraduate Department in 1979. It was the first Political Science Department of Wardha District. RTM Nagpur University has recognized the department as a **Place for Higher Learning and Research.**

The Department of Political Science has been having a qualified and experienced faculty since its inception. Prof. P.K. Budhe, Prof. D.S. Patne, Prof. S.B. Deshmukh, Principal V.D. Gomkale were our ex- faculty members. Dr. V.D. Gomkale, who was also the Principal of the college, made great contribution to the subject by working on different academic bodies of the University. Prof. Suresh Deshmukh, who is now the Chairman of our education society, served the Postgraduate department as a faculty member for seventeen years. He has also served as a **Member of Legislative Assembly, Wardha** from 2009 to 2014. At present, we have three permanent faculties with Dr. V.R. Bobde as the Head. He was a member on the Board of Studies of RTM Nagpur University, Nagpur and SGBA University, Amravati. He is assisted by Prof. R.M. Bele and Prof. E.R. Murkute. The department has a tradition of producing merits in the university examination every year.

V.D. Deolikar, R.M. Bele, S.V. Ghorpade and R.W. Bhatkar stood first in the order of merit respectively in 1993, 1995, 2000, and 2009, while Prafulla Lohakare stood IX and Ku. Sonali Salodkar VII in the order of merit respectively in 2001 and 2014.

Every year we constitute "Political Science Study Circle" which is purely a students' body that carries out different activities of the department. The department arranges the guest lectures of eminent personalities in the field of Political Science. Dr. P.L. Joshi, (Nagpur), Dr. B.L. Bhole (Nagpur), Dr. P.S. Kane, (Amravati), Dr. Vasant Raipurkar (Nagpur), Dr. R.V.

Ranade (Nagpur), Dr. Alka Deshmukh, Dr. Benudhar Pradhan, (Orissa), Dr. Amit Dholkiya (Badodara), Dr. Uttara Sahastrabuddhe (Mumbai), Dr. Rashmi Bhure (Mumbai) have delivered guest lecture. The Library annually subscribes a variety of Journals and periodicals such as Economic and Political Weekly, Human Rights Journal, DARJ Journal, Mainstream, Competition Success, India Today, Yojna, Sadhana, Samaj Prabodhan Patrika, India (Quarterly), Indian Journal of Political Science, etc.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIOLOGY

The Department of Sociology began with the inception of the college in 1960. Among the subjects of humanities, Sociology has its own importance and is invariably taught in almost all arts colleges, as it is closely related to social life of the people. The knowledge of Sociology is essential to understand the human society. Large numbers of students voluntarily offer Sociology as an optional subject.

The department has a glorious tradition. The department at the time of inception was headed by a renowned teacher and a sociologist, Dr. B.K. Khadse who is respected everywhere for his erudition and scholarship. He is not only a good orator, but a true academician with a vast knowledge of Sociology. Even after his retirement, he was a recognized University Research Guide for Ph.D. He has authored many books. Late Prof. S.V. Lohkare was also a faculty member and rendered his valuable services to the department.

Many renowned scholars have paid visits to the department during past years. People like Dr. P.L.Bhandarkar, Dr.N.S.Vaidya, Dr.Toshniwal, Dr.Prakash Bobade, Dr. M.L. Kasare, and Dr. Tarak Kate visited the institute and their guidance broadened the students' knowledge of Sociology.

At present, the department has two duly qualified permanent faculty and three contributory Lecturers. Prof. D.P.Deshmukh, Head of the Department, is an experienced teacher with 22 years of service to his credit. Prof. Sandip Raibole has joined as a permanent faculty member from October 2016. Prof. Dr. Miss C.M. Satpute was also a permanent faculty in this department up till now, but she opted for voluntary retirement on health grounds in 2015.

DEPARTMENT OF GEOGRAPHY

The Department of Geography was established in the college in 1967. Mr. V. H. Ghorpade rendered yeoman's services to the department and later on became the Principal of the college. He occupied several coveted posts of Nagpur University such as Chairman of BOS in Geography, Dean of Social Science faculty, and a member to the Management Council of Nagpur University. At present Dr. D. S. Bhugul is the Head of the Department and has recently been awarded Ph. D. on the topic "Spatio Temporal Analysis of Irrigation sources, Irrigated area and Cropping Pattern in Eastern Vidarbha (1981-2001): A Geographical Analysis". He has completed a minor research project entitled "Surface and groundwater resources in Wardha District." He has also attended national and International Seminars and conferences and published research papers. He is assisted by Prof. B. M. Lohakare since 2000. He has also contributed several research papers at national and international seminars.

The department organises guest lectures on varied themes which are in the purview of 'Geography Study Circle'. Geography being a practical subject, emphasis is given on study tours. The students are taken on study tours to give them practical exposure. The department celebrates 14th January as the Geography Day. The department subscribes different Geographic Journals for the benefit of the students and are placed in central library. Six of our students have cleared NET/ SET up till 2015.

From the next session, a four-week certificate course in Tourism is to be started in collaboration with the departments of History, Law and English.

DEPARTMENT OF HOME-ECONOMICS

Home-Economics undergraduate department was established in the academic year 1972-73 and the postgraduate department in the academic year 1978-79. The aim and objective of this department is to build up the confidence and career of the students leading to the overall personality development of their personality. Prof. Kusum Junankar successfully and efficiently shouldered the responsibility of Home-Economics department. She also held various responsible positions on the academic bodies of the university. She has authored various books on Home-Economics, Child Care, Child Nutrition and Cooking in particular. She had played a pivotal role and had a lion's share in augmenting the status of Home-Economics department.

On superannuation of Prof. Kusum Junankar, Dr. Rajani Mehre her successor, implemented various projects for the betterment of the department. Dr. Rajani Mehre was the chairperson of the Board of Studies of Home-Economics of RTM Nagpur University, Nagpur and held various positions of responsibility. She made a positive contribution in various social activities. She was a guide, mentor and a facilitator for many students in the department. The Home- Economics department was set up with the sole objective of an overall development of students belonging to rural areas, and even today continues to be benefitted, leading to winwin situation for students and management. She met with an ill-fated accident in 2011. The post has been filled up by Prof. Smt Pratibha Katkar who has cleared both NET and SET examination. The department also has contributory teachers.

DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHOLOGY

Department of Psychology was established in June 1986. The department is having a well-equipped laboratory including Psychology Experiments and Tests. The Department runs an undergraduate course of BA. Majority of the students come from rural areas. The department has organized various programmes to enhance the knowledge of students. The department has organized a state leval seminar on Community Mental Health, in which Dr. R. D. Helode, Ex. Professor & Head, Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur and Dr. C. G. Deshpande, Ex. Professor & Head, Mumbai University, Mumbai guided the delegates. A Workshop on New Trends in Positive Psychology was organized in 2015, in which Dr. S. S. Nathawat, Jaipur, (Rajasthan) was the visiting professor. A Workshop on Statistical Application in Behavioral Research was also organized where Dr. A. K. Sain, Ex. Professor & Head, Delhi University, Delhi came and guided the students. The students are greatly benefitted by such seminars and workshops.

Faculties from the department have conducted seminars, workshops & delivered lectures on Stress Management, Motivation, Personality Development & Parenting in Wardha. Dr. K. P. Nimbalkar worked as the Chairman of the Board of Studies in Psychology of R. T. M. Nagpur University, Nagpur. He was also member of Faculty of Social Sciences and Academic Council. He was also the member of the Board of Studies in Psychology of Gondwana University, Gadchiroli. He has also worked as a member of Juvenile Justice Board, Wardha District. He also gives consultancy to students and psychic patients. He has penned down several books and articles to create awareness among students and to help the public in general. He has been awarded with **Dnyndeep Sanmman Puraskar** for his contribution in the field of education. The department has been recognized as a **Place for Higher Learning and Research** by RTM Nagpur University, Nagpur.

DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC

It was due to the efforts of the founder Chairman Late Bapuraoji Deshmukh, that the Music Department began in the college during the academic year, 1969-1970 with the sheer objective to create interest and develop the latent talent in Music among the students coming from the rural areas. The department was headed by Dr. Shantashila Satyanathan who was a Ph.D. from Indira Kala Sangeet Vishwavidyalaya, Khairagad. After her superanuation, Prof. Tara Vilayachi, joined the department and gave her services till January 2012. Prof. Aruna Harley assisted her as a lecturer in Music from September 2003 and now heads the department. She is assisted by Shri. Gopal Thosar, a tabla player and a music assistant.

The department is well-equipped with traditional and modern musical instruments. The department also has a small library which was donated by one of the alumni - Shri. Sudhir Bhagat who retired as an Excise Inspector. The department helps the sister concerns to organise different musical programmes. The department has a "Nadankit Mandal" wherein great luminaries like Pt. Prabhakar Deshkar, Prof. Prabhakar Khardenvis, Pt. Gopalrao Wadegaonkar, Dr. Narayan Mangrulkar, Dr. Kalyani Deshmukh, Dr. Aparna Agnihotri, Dr. Sadhana Shiledar, Shri Avnindra Sevlikar, Shri Anirudhha Joshi, Sau. Ruchira Kedar (Pune), Shri. Bhavik Rathod (Pune), Prof. Laxmikant Deshmukh (Pune), Pt. Prabhakar Karekar (Mumbai), Pt. Chandrakant Limaye (Mumbai), Shri. Prashad Khaparde, Dr. Prabha Atre (Pune), Smt. Gangubai Hangal, Smt. Purabi Mukharji (Kalkatta), Smt. Usha Mangeshkar (Mumbai), Kishor Bhanushali (Jr. Devanand, Mumbai) have visited the department and appreciated the concern of the teachers to promote music among the masses.

The department can boast of having consistently won solo and group competitions at the university "Yuwarang" and "Youth Festivals". It has been honoured in 1999 at the hands of the then Chief Minister, Shri Vilasrao Deshmukh with a cash prize of Rs. 5000/- and a shield. Apart from these competitions, the Music department has won several laurels. The department organises several activities. In 1983, the department organised a state level seminar on Music wherein several teachers of the state were present. The department organised a one-day workshop on 16th January 1999. A two-day workshop was organised on 3rd and 4th January, 2012 wherein Shri. Vishwanath Oak, Aurangabad, and Smt. Madhuritai Oak were the resource persons. On 1st of October 2013, the department organised a national level seminar entitled "The Indian Music in the 21st Century: New Horizons and Heights" which was funded by U.G.C. and had brought out the post-conference proceedings with an ISBN number.

The department also ran short-term certificate courses for the students who were interested in Music. But the courses had to be stopped due to the dearth of students.

The department has produced many well-known illuminaries and musicians such Prof. Shyam Gundawar (Chandrapur), Shri. Sudhir Bhagat (Nagpur), Prof. Vikas Kale (Wardha), Dr. Madhuri Kale, Meeta Mahoday (South America), Shri. Ajay Hedau, Angha Rande, Subhash Arbadewar, Prof. Sanjay Patki (Jalgaon), Dr. Nutan Jalit (Mumbai), Prof. Pramod Wagarkar, Shrikant Barahate, Chandrashekar Deshpande, Rajesh Chaudhari, Shailesh Jagtap, Jivan Bangade, Nilesh Wankhede, Ravi Khade, Shri. Parteki (Hinganghat), Pradnya Khudare, Swati Pokale, Prof. Gunwant Sawarkar, etc.

The department is planning to start a P.G. department in Music, so as to enable the rural students to complete their higher studies.

DEPARTMENT OF HOME SCIENCE

In the olden days, generally girls received education from their parents and grandparents, but with the scientific development, various new concepts have evolved replacing the old ones. Thus, Home Science has also now become a science and an art. Keeping this goal in view Home Science dept. was established in 1969. The faculty of Home Science is led by **Prof. Dr. V.A. Deshmukh**, Principal of this college, who belongs to this department. A regional level UGC-sponsored symposium was organized in January 2007 on " **Women Entrepreneurship** – **A need for national development**". Out of six faculty members three are Ph.D. holders, two have submitted their theses for Ph.D. and one member is in the process of submitting her thesis. The faculty has completed five **Minor Research Projects funded by U G C.** Four faculty are Ph.D. Supervisors. **Dr V. A. Deshmukh** was a member of Management Council and the Chairman of Board of Studies in Human Development in R.T.M. Nagpur University, Nagpur. He is an Executive Member of the Association of Indian College Principals. He is also a member of Advisory Board for Bor Forest Sanctuary.

Prof. J.G.Kashikar is a member of the faculty in the department and her subject is Home Science Extension. A Ph.D. Supervisor, She is guiding two students at present. Prof. Dr. V. P. Bodade, is a faculty in Family resource management. She was a member of Senate and the Chairman of the Board of Studies in Family Resource Management in R.T.M. Nagpur University, Nagpur. Presently, she is on the Advisory Board of the International Peer Reviewed Research Journal-Aadhar Publication and Aadhar Social Research - Published by Development and Training Institute Amravati, She has written a book on,"Resource Management". She is Supervisor for guiding Ph.D. Students in Nagpur University. Prof. S. Y. Kawaley is member of faculty and her specialization is in Textile and Clothing. In Oct. 2014, the department of Textile and Clothing has been recognized as 'Place of Higher Learning and Research' by RTM Nagpur University, Napgur. Prof V.B. Shahane, a faculty in Food and Nutrition, has submitted her thesis for Ph.D. in Nagpur University. Prof Dr. K. C. Kulkarni, a faculty in Animal Physiology, was awarded "Best Research Paper Award 2011". Her paper was on, "Effect of Life Style Changes on Mental Health of Adolescent". Two faculty members namely Dr. Sarita Vishwakarma for Human Development and Dr. Arti Choudhari in Physics have joined as Assistant Professors from October, 2016.

Some of the eminent personalities started their career from this dept. Among them was **Dr. Kamal Singh,** who joined as a lecturer in this dept. in Physics, went on to become the **Vice-Chancellor of Sant Gadgebaba Amravati University, Amravati. Prof. Satyanathan** also joined as a lecturer in Physics department and thereafter became an **IAS officer. Prof. R.D. Kolapkar**, a faculty of biology deptartment ,completed a course related to handicapped children in Canada and later on became the Dean of the Home Science faculty, and the Chairman of the board of Home Science Extension in R.T.M., Nagpur University, Nagpur. Prof. Dr. V. Adhau, Prof. P. Rudkar and Prof D. V. Bhoyar ex-faculty members were also the Chairman of the Board of Studies in R.T.M. Nagpur University, Nagpur. **Prof. Dr.K.S. Jadhav**, an ex-faculty, was also a member of Management Council as well as a member of Senate for two tenures and the Chairman in Food and Nutrition in Board of Studies and presently she is working as professor and Head of P. G. Department of Home Science, RTM Nagpur University, Nagpur.

DEPARTMENT OF TEXTILE & CLOTHING

The Postgraduate Department of Textile and Clothing is one of the oldest departments in the college, established in 1986. Till 2010, this was the only P.G department in RTM Nagpur University, Nagpur. The students come from different places of Maharashtra & outside. The department has a well-epuipped laboratory and a qualified staff. Total intake of students is 20. The students are admitted only on the basis of merit. To this day, more than 450

students have passed out from the college. R.T.M. Nagpur University, Nagpur has recognised the department as the Centre for Higher Learning & Research in 2014. At present, there are two students carrying out their Doctoral Research. Every year, students conduct different research projects and dissertations both in house and outside the institution. Most of the research work is carried out in the department under the guidance of experienced and university recognised staff. Every year, about 45 -50 % students get off campus recruitment and about 15% students start their own business. Many eminent academicians and scientists frequently visit the department and share their views. Various programmes such as guest lectures, seminars, workshops, skill development training programmes, exhibition-cum-sale, arranging fashion shows, paper presentations are organised at college level for the students with a view to foster interest among them. Industrial visits to different textile industries are organised such as Morarji Mills, Butibori, Nagpur, Raymond's Industries, Yavtmal, GIMA Textile Ltd, Hinganghat, Pee-Vee Textiles, Jam, Weavers service centre, Nagpur, MGIRI, Wardha, and SMBD Soot Girani, Wardha. Students and staff members participate in National and International conferences for paper presentations and poster presentations. Students participate in various social and extension activities.

DEPARTMENT OF LAW

Established in the year 1971, the Department of Law is one of the first law departments amongst the Nagpur universities' affiliated colleges. It provides law education to the rural students, and is the first to offer undergraduate, postgraduate and doctoral degrees in law after the university department. Presently, Prof Dr. A.G. Pawde is the Head of the Department. He is the **Chairman of the Disciplinary Action Committee of RTM Nagpur University, Nagpur.** He was the Chairman of BOS and the Dean of Faculty of Law, RTM Nagpur Univiersity, Nagpur. He has also represented the Senate.. He is a legal advisor to several educational institutions and NGOs in Wardha District. He is well known for his **free legal consultancy.**

Prof. Dr. R. K Mor, a winner of the prestigious **UGC Raman Post-Doctoral Fellowship** and two other professors namely Dr. Prof. M.N. Bendle and Prof. Shipra Singam are the other faculty members. Prof. Sipra Singam is a **registered patent attorney**, since 2003.

Three of the faculty members are Doctorates and are Ph.D. supervisors; and **19 students** are carrying out their doctoral studies under their supervision. The Fourth faculty member has submitted her doctoral thesis for the award of Ph.D. degree in R.T.M. Nagpur University, Nagpur. Prof. Dr. R.K. Mor also publishes an online Journal with the title "The Current National Law Journal" as an open access resource wherein the editorial board comprises of Dr. A.G. Pawde, Dr. R.K. Mor, Mr. Scott A. McMillan, Dean The McMillan Academy of Law, San Diego, CA, USA. The department is the only recognized Place for Higher Studies and research in Law by RTM Nagpur University apart form its own department.. **Three Minor research projects have been completed by the faculty members.**

Head of the Department has recently visited Mauritius to present research paper in an international conference sponsored by six different Universities and United Nations Organization. One other faculty member has presented a paper at international conference organized by the Dept. of Law, university of Johannesburg, South Africa. Prof. Dr. M.N. Bendle has been awarded the prestigious **Bharta Shiksha Ratna Award** for his contribution in the field of law studies. The department has organised one State Level Conference on the topic "Cyber Law and Information Technology: Contemporary Issues." on 20th October 2012.

Students of the department regularly find place in the University merit list and many of them are selected as Judicial Magistrate First class and Civil Judge Junior division, District Judges, etc. Many of the students have joined Bar and are practising as independent lawyers. This is how department is working with a single motto, "Education for all and Employment for all"



CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

Vision: To Provide excellent academic orientation to learners coming from rural areas

Our founder Chairman, Late Bapuraoji Deshmukh had long back stated, "शिक्षण शाळा महाविद्यालयातून तर दिले जातेच पण त्याचे लोण खेड्या पाड्यातील गरीबांच्या झोपडी पर्यंत पोहचिपणचे कार्य मी जास्त मोलाचे समजतो", which means that there are several schools and colleges catering education in cities, but I think it is more valuable to give education to the rural masses. Hence, as stated by our founder Chairman, we wish to provide value-based quality education to the students coming from rural areas.

Mission: To develop professional attitude and competency skills of learners in chosen areas of learning.

- To foster scientific outlook among students.
- To impart knowledge that will help them to encounter real life situations.
- To inculcate moral values and social responsibility.
- The institution communicates the vision and mission to the students, teachers and other stake-holders through our website, prospectus, meetings of staff council, parent and alumni meet.

Objectives: The institute is committed to become a centre for excellence in the faculties of Humanities, Social Sciences, Home Science and Law.

- 1. Selection of teachers is done on merit basis and the institutes facilitates them to acquire professional skills resulting into their academic growth.
- 2. Provision of good infrastructure for learning such as library, laboratories, internet access, etc.
- 3. Creation of positive environment of learning with good work culture.
- 4. Systematic process of teaching and learning.

The institution develops and deploys the action plan for effective implementation in the following manner:

- a) Provides academic calendar and teaching plan to the students.
- b) Enrol the students for various extension activities such as NCC, NSS, Continuing Adult Education, Population Education and Mahila Adhyayan.
- c) HODs assign the workload to the individual faculty.
- d) The unit-wise teaching plan is prepared by every faculty to facilitate teaching.
- e) The home assignments are given to the students.
- f) The students are evaluated through unit tests and terminal examinations.

Support from the University / Institution to Teachers:

- The University organises orientation programmes, refresher courses, short-term courses and workshops for teachers.
- The institution permits the teachers to visit such programmes.
- Boards of Studies of the university are responsible for the framing of curriculum and conducting of examinations. Hence, related issues are resolved by them.
- Experts from university departments and research institutes are invited to deliver guest lectures.
- To make the normal method of teaching more effective, the institution provides audiovisual aids such as O.H.P., CDs, DVDs, charts, models, etc.
- To make the teachers self-sufficient, the college has a central library with a rich collection of books and internet access.

The institution deputes its faculties to participate in the curriculum meetings organised by the university and other institutions.

- The required teaching and administrative faculty is appointed for the smooth functioning of the college.
- Funds are earmark and are provided for the relevant requirements and activities that take plance around the year.
- The institution also invites members of Boards of Studies / expert faculties to give guidance regarding the newly introduced syllabus.
- The departments then organise departmental meetings to chalk out a plan for teaching the programme.
- If need be, teachers are appointed on clock hour basis for the completion of curriculum.

The institution sends its students to the nearby industries to do internship whereby they get exposure in manufacturing and sales, which ultimately develops their skills and boosts them with confidence. Many a time, such internship helps them in procuring jobs.

- We are of the opinion that students with the help of their commitment can make the human society a better, happier and prosperous one. This can be brought about through extension and N.S.S. activities.
- The knowledge of students is tested through home assignments, seminars, test examinations, etc.
- Their understanding is analysed through interactions or group discussions.
- Their curiosity and interest is developed through guest lectures, outdoor visits and extra readings.
- The Environment Studies is a part of undergraduate programme which help the students to get acquainted with the ecological system and environment.

The institution had offered three certificate courses as mentioned in table no. 1.1.7. The objectives behind designing these courses were:

Admission Procedure: Admissions were given to undergraduate students on 'first come first serve' basis.

Evaluation: Evaluation of students was carried out by their performance in theory and practical examination.

3. Certificate Course in Tourism

Session of Introduction: 2017-18 The course will start in June 2017.

Maharashtra State Govt. has allocated Rs, 256 carores in August, 2015 to promote tourism in Wardha District. Hence, the institution has decided to start a certificate course in Toursim. The aims and objectives of running this course are as follow:

- The institution wishes to work in unison with the decision taken by State Govt.
- It aims to provide skilled tourist guides and receptionists.
- The institution wishes to give training to its students, so that they become self-employed.
- The institution is committed to give training to the nearby unemployed people so that they are able to stand on their own feet.
- It also wishes to facilitate the tourists coming to Sevagram and Pawnar Ashram by starting such a course.

Admission Procedure: Admissions will be given to XII pass students on 'first come first serve' basis.

Number of Seats Available: 20

Evaluation: Evaluation of students will be carried out by their performance in theory, Viva-voce based on tourist centres.

 - At present we have no dual degree programme but we have an integrated five year programme wherein B.A., LL.B degree is awarded.

 - 2. Vertical Mobility is offered to all the students as they can do their M.A. or M.Sc. (Textile and Clothing), or LL.M. in various disciplines.
 - 3. Students have freedom for enrolment in NCC, NSS, Continuing Adult Education, Population Education and Women Studies, etc.
 - 4. Vertical mobility is offered to students of P.G. to do their Ph.D. programmes as the college is a recognised centre for research and higher learning. Students can go for the Ph.D. programmes in five subjects Political Science, Law, Textile and Clothing History and Psychology.
 - 5. The institution has a provision for academic flexibility in terms of skill development. The students are encouraged and promoted to participate in seminars, quiz contests, debates and other extracurricular activities. Campus interviews are also organised.
 - 6. The institution has made a provision for the academic flexibility of the students to do their Certificate Course in Tourism while pursuing their education.
 - 7. A student belonging to Sciencer or Commerce faculty can also join in Arts faculty.

Yes, the institution offers self-financed Post-Graduate Programmes in English, Marathi, Political Science, Economics, Textile and clothing, Home Economics and LL.M in six disciplines. Admissions, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification and salaries disbursed are as per the directives and norms of the university / central and state government received from time to time. Such classes are engaged by the senior faculty and contributory teachers.

- 8. Study material, notes, model answers are provided in such classes.

- 1. There are well-functioning units of NSS, NCC, Population Education, Continuing Adult Education and Women's Studies in the college which try to bring awareness among students through programmes and camps organised in villages.
- 2. Climate change and Environmental Education is provided through field visits, films, projects, etc.
- 3. Guest lectures are organised on the above-mentioned issues.
- 4. Donations to Sainik Nidhi, flag donations, C.M. and P.M. Relief Funds are collected.
- 5. The institute has adopted a village named Karanji Bhoge which is 10 kilometer away from the campus. The students provide various kinds of assistance to the villagers.
- 6. In collaboration with the Centre for Sericulture and Bee-Keeping Research, R.T.M. Nagpur University, Nagpur, the college on March 20,2016 organised a one day workshop on 'Sericulture and Bee-Keeping Technology' for the local farmers.
- 1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?
 - moral and ethical values
 - employable and life skills
 - better career options
 - community orientation

The institution organises the following enrichment programmes for the holistic development of its students:-

- Lectures are organised to make students aware of social values.
- Use of ICT is promoted in the college so as to make them computer friendly.
- Value Education and Environment Science is taught through NSS and Extension activities.
- Craft Exhibition, Fashion shows, Food Fair are annually arranged in the college, aiming to make the students self-employed.
- Guest lectures are organised on thrust areas such as attending interviews and group discussions.
- Students are given career guidance and prepared for competitive exams.
- The career guidance cell helps students in notifying advertisements and placements.
- Personality development programmes are also organised so as to enable the students to face the present day problems.
- Yoga Day is annually observed on 21st June . Yoga is promoted in the college where in the students are made to participate in Yoga Asanas
- In consonance with the National Policy, the college also has taken decision to promot use of Khadi clothes. Teaching and Non-Teaching staff have been directed to wear Khadi clothes once in a week.
- 1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The students from Home Science and Textile and Clothing often give their feedback to include some topics in their curriculum. For example, in Maharashtra, Rangoli

Design is the part and parcel of domestic life, but it is not included in the curriculum. Similarly, the pattern of body frock is not included in the university curriculum of Home Economics. The students suggested changes in the regional embroidery and stitching pattern of the body frock.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The institution undertakes certain steps for the enrichment programmes. The institution has developed an infrastructure which is enriched with modern academic facilities and electronic teaching tools in the classrooms. College has set up IQAC to monitor and evaluate the quality of education. The college library is the largest in the district. The students are encouraged to participate sincerely and whole-heartedly in every programme. The institute also invites persons from outside to deliver lectures on different subjects. They also provide valuable suggestion regarding further improvement.

1.4 Feedback System

- 1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?
 - The college deputes the faculty members to attend workshops and meetings organised for the development of curriculum.
 - Nine of our faculty members are on the Boards of Studies and are responsible for bringing changes in the curriculum.
 - Some of them have also published books in harmony with the programmes taught.
- 1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

The teachers obtain feedback from students both orally and in writing, regarding the curriculum. The feedback forms are filled up by the students every year which include questions on curriculum enrichment. The suggestions are then communicated to the university through the members of Board of studies which frame the syllabus.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)

Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the college would like to include.

The college already has P.G. courses in various subjects. For the sake of vertical mobility, the college has started Ph.D. programmes in five subjects, namely Political Science, History, Law, Textile and Clothing, and Psychology. The university has recognised the college as a centre for research and higher learning in the above-mentioned subjects from the academic year, 2014-15. The college has decided to start a four week certificate course in Tourism from the month of June, 2017.

2.1. Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The college ensures publicity of the admission process in the following manner –

- Publicity regarding college admission is done on college website.
- Notices regarding admission process are displayed in the college premises from the date of declaration of results of qualifying examination.
- Separate prospectus for U.G. and P.G. is made available.
- The prospectus includes information regarding various combination of subjects, availability of seats, application form, schemes for meritorious and backward class students, etc.
- Information brochures are circulated to various institutions of Wardha district.
- If necessary, advertisement for admission is given in local newspapers and is telecast on local news channels.

The college ensures transparency in the admission process in the following manner:-

- Admission committees are formed for respective classes; and students are informed about the rules and policies related to admission.
- Number of seats available is mentioned in the prospectus.
- In most of the courses admission is given on 'first come first serve basis.' If the number of takers is more for the course, the merit list is prepared and displayed on the notice board. For example, in XI Science, the takers are more than the available seats, hence merit list is displayed and admissions are given on the basis of merit as per the reservation policy of the State and Central Government. In case of grievances, the problem is sorted out by the Principal in consultation with the admission committee.
- The computerized admission lists are displayed on the webisite, notice boards strictly adhering to the rules and regulations of the State Govt. and RTM Nagpur University.

In case of grievances, the problem is sorted out by the principal in consultation with the admission committee.

Admission process is initially reviewed by the admission committee and later on in the Staff Council and L.M.C. meetings. Suggestions are given to increase the number of admissions and get relatively better students. Introduction of Yeshwant Scholarship has also resulted in more admissions in the college.

everal factors that affect MorLast five years have witnessed a vertical progression in the strength of the college. In the academic year 2011-12 total strength of Senior college was 1333 students whereas in the academic year 2015-16 it is 1920. This increase in the strength is due to the several academic initatives taken up by the college. There has been a systematic planning and execution to attract more students towards the institution. The initatives taken up were as follows

- 1. The college has successeded in the improving teacher qualities. In 2009-10 24% of our faculty were Ph.D. whereas now it is 53.33% and 20% more faculty have already submitted their thesis for the award of Ph.D. Moreover teachers have been motivated to attend orientation / refresher courses, attend seminar and publish theri papers in Reserach Journals thereby improving the teacher quality
- 2. In 2011-12 the institution decided to launch 'Yeshwant Scholarship' which was the result of donations received from the superannuated staff members and the contribution of the present staff towards a corpus fund. The introduction of Yeshwant Scholarship has certainly resulted in more number of admissions and has also attracted meritorious students.
- 3. Renovation and upgradation of the infrastructure such as classrooms, administrative office, library, etc. has also helped us to attract more admission.
- 4. Increae in number of books and journals has also contributed to make the institute more popular.
- 5. Appointment of young, dyanamic and well qualified librarian in 2011 has sent a positive message among the students as he has introduced automation in library, MOPAC, SMS alert, Institutional Repository, online resource services for the users.

The admission to P.G. Courses shows a decrease in number due to change in university policy from time to time. Earlier, P.G. Courses followed the annual pattern, whereas now the university has introduced semester pattern. Earlier, external students who had not cleared all the subjects were given admission to higher classes under the provision of Allowed To Keep Term (ATKT), but now such admissions are denied to them which have ultimately resulted in the decrease in admission to P.G. Courses. The admissions in M.A. (Home Economics) have received a setback due to the passing away of our regular faculty, Dr. Mrs R.A. Mehre. The college is committed to fill up the post at the earliest, as soon as it receives clearance from the Joint Director's office.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1. How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure

adherence to government policies in this regard?

There are only two such differently-abled students in the college. The college always takes care of these students. For such students, classes are allocated in rooms that are easily accessible to them. The college has already built ramps for differently-abled students. The college is committed to provide every kind of facility to help such students. Yeshwant welfare Fund of Rs. 2000/- each is also given to such students. Such students are given additional library help. Special lectures and contact sessions are arranged to understand their problems so as to help them.

2.2.2. Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, the teachers, right at the beginning of the session, make an assessment of the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme. Their previous knowledge and skills are tested / verified and, if required, the beginning of the session is devoted to refresh the previous knowledge. If needed, the faculty devotes some time to revise the earlier learning.

2.2.3. What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

The institution indentifies slow and advanced learners through face-to-face communication in the class. The strategies for the slow and advanced learners are as follow:-

- Remedial and Tutorial classes are available for students who are weak at English.
- Slow learners are encouraged to speak in group discussions and seminars, so that they could build up their confidence. Sometimes cluster groups are formed for interaction. Here, not only are they able to exchange their ideas, but they also build up their confidence.
- Advanced learners are encouraged to go for extra reading. Reference books are suggested by the faculty. They are also asked to prepare for competitive exams, but at the same time they are advised to help the weak students and work as mentors to uplift them.
- 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

As the college is a co-education institution, the college has taken steps in order to sensitize its staff and students on different issues.

- The women empowerment cell organises seminars and workshops on gender issues. It also invites distinguished female personalities for guest lectures.
- Various NSS activities make students imbibe a sense of belonging and inclusion. Street plays based on gender issues, superstitions, dowry system, addiction, etc. are staged in different parts of the district.
- The college also has an **Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell** which aims at providing a conducive atmosphere to learning. Precautions are taken to provide a healthy atmosphere to woman employees and girl students.

- The college also has an **Anti-Ragging cell** which tries to curb the incidences of ragging in and off the campus and undertaking in respect of ragging is taken from both the students and parents at the time of admission.
- A complaint / suggestion box is also available for the students to make their complaints / suggestions.
- Environmental Studies is a compulsory subject for B.A., B.Sc. (Home Sci.) Second year programme .Moreover lectures are organised on ecology and imbalance. The students are taken on study tours to give them the knowledge of environment, ecology and wild life. The college maintains Saturday as No-Vehicle Day.

As majority of our students are female, following arrangements have been made in the campus to make their stay comfortable:-

- 1. Separate common room for female students.
- 2. Separate washrooms for male and female students.
- 3. Special first-aid box designed for women.
- 4. Centre of women's studies and services.
- 5. Special Health check-up camp by lady doctors for girl students.
- 6. Separate parking places for boys and girls.
- 7. Separate hostel for girls.
- 8. Lectures are organized on topics like Ecology, Environmental Imbalance, Swachcha Bharat Abhiyaan, empowerment of women, importance of reptiles, etc.
- 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The advanced learners are identified from the marks secured in the preceding examinations and their responses in the classrooms. The teachers advise them for extra reading and motivate them to play a lead role in assisting and inspiring weak students. The faculty also provides special guidance to them. Advanced learners are motivated to participate in inter- collegiate competitions such as seminars, quiz contests, debates, essay competitions, etc. Career counselling committee and placement cell provides them information about higher studies and competitive examinations. Their morale is boosted to prepare papers in seminars and conferences.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections, etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The institution analyses the data and information on the academic performance of students at risk of drop out, in the following manner:-

- Special attention is paid to such students through cluster meetings.
- Additional tutorials / remedial classes are conducted for them.
- They are motivated to participate in seminars, so as to build up their confidence.
- Their problems are sorted out through Parent- Teacher meet.
- The IQAC and the Principal take necessary action regarding suggestions / complaints received.

2.3 Teaching – Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules?

(Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The college plans and organises the teaching, learning and evaluation schedule as follows:-

- a) The college organises a staff council meeting where an academic calendar is prepared and students are made aware of it.
- b) Every member of the faculty prepares a 'teaching plan' of his / her subject.
- c) Timetable is prepared for the execution of the teaching plan. Subject-wise workload is distributed to the faculty by the Head of the department.
- d) Regular classes and practicals are conducted as per the timetable from the very first day of the session.
- e) Remedial and subject tutorials are held for the better understanding of the subject.
- f) Personal difficulties of students are sorted out through teacher- student interaction.
- g) Subject difficulties are solved by engaging extra classes.
- h) Curricular and extracurricular activities take place round the year for all-round development of students.
- i) Teaching plans and classes are regularly monitored by the Heads, IQAC Co-Ordinator and Principal of the college.
- j) The Examination Committee prepares a plan for conducting terminal examination.
- k) The faculty evaluates the students' answer-books and provides suggestions for improvement.
- 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

The performance of students is analysed in the IQAC meetings, and the teachers are advised to take appropriate steps to improve the teaching-learning process. They are asked to make the teaching interactive by involving the students in discussions. They are also advised to make use of audio-visual aids such as OHP, LCD projector, etc. In the IQAC meeting held at the end of the session, the outcomes of the proposed plans and the difficulties faced in the execution are discussed; the methods for improvement are suggested. IQAC looks after the library enrichment through Library Advisory Committee.

2.3.3. How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

It has been our cardinal principle to make our learning student-centric. The teacher tries to make the learning interactive by a two-way discussion and not a monologue. The teachers also use the following support structures for interactive learning:-

- a) Student Seminars
- b) Internet
- c) Reading Room Facility
- d) Guest lectures on different subjects. For example, the students of Home Science and Home Economics are given knowledge about food processing, flower arrangement, Home management, interior decoration, embroidery, fashion designing, etc.
- e) Group Dissucssions on different topic are encouraged.
- f) Students are given home assignments to foster their learning.
- g) The teacher interacts with the students one to one in order to sort out his / her problems
- h) Teachers feed back is taken to make the learing more student centric.
- 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The institution organises seminars, conferences, workshops, guest lectures, moot court etc., and students are advised to take inspiration from the resource persons and eminent personalities in thought and knowledge. The junior students are allowed to interact freely with their seniors. The senior students then act as mentors to develop the juniors. Students are also able to enhance their skills and thinking by preparing charts, models, exhibits, etc. Scientic temperament is cultivated among students through inculcating research disciplines, health lectures, diet advice, lectures on eradication of superstitions, etc.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The lecture method of teaching remains the most prevalent method of imparting instructions. However, classrooms are made interactive by involving the students in discussions and question and answers.

Following technologies and facilities are made available for effective teaching:

- 1. E-learning by downloading the information from internet.
- 2. Educational CDs and DVDs.
- 3. Open access to journals and periodicals.
- 4. Use of INFLIBNET facility.
- 5. Use of ICT(OHP,DLP) during lectures and seminars.
- 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

Most of the faculty members are computer literate and many of them use internet facilities to keep pace with the recent developments in their subjects. All the faculty members attend seminars, conferences and workshops to update their knowledge. More than half of the faculty members have completed their doctoral research in their subjects. The college has also been organising seminars and conferences every academic year. Eminent and well known personalities are invited for such seminars; and students get an opportunity to interact with them and get the first-hand knowledge about the recent development in various subjects.

As most of the students come from rural areas, they lack computer literacy. For them library books, magazines, journals are the source of knowledge and recent information in various subjects. However, the faculty encourages and motivates the students to make use of modern teaching aids.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counselling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

The institution takes much care to provide academic, personal, psychological support and guidance services to students in different ways. Professional counselling is provided by organising visits to industries, institutions like Legislative Assembly, High Court, etc. The purpose of this activity is to help the students to obtain practical knowledge and professional attitude. Besides this, the college conducts preparatory classes for NET / SET, MPSC / UPSC examinations. Ph.D. supervisors also provide academic guidance for research work to the students. The college has a career cell which guides the students for competitive examinations. The institute has organized a course work of sixty hours on Research Methodology for the students enrolled under Ph.D.

Programmes. The institute has been approved by RTM Nagpur University to organize course work programmes on Research Methodology. Lecture regarding health issues such as diet, mental health are organised by the institute. Psychological councelling sessions are also available in the college premises.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The following innovative teaching approaches / methods have been adopted by the faculty:-

- Use of educational CDs and D.V.Ds for student centric approach.
- Use of O.H.P.
- Use of P.P.T.
- Use of charts, posters, models, exhibits, experimental kits, etc. The college has made efforts to encourage the faculty to adopt innovative approaches.
- The institution provides all the necessary arrangement and infrastructure.
- Organises workshops based on audio-video appliances, internet, power point presentation, etc.
- Deputes the faculty member to workshops, seminars and conferences.

The impact of such innovative practices on students is as under:-

- 1. Teaching sessions become more interactive and absorbing due to audio-visual aids.
- 2. Videos and animation develop a better understanding than the black board teaching.
- 3. The students get recent updates about different subjects through internet and power point presentations.
- 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

Library resources are used to facilitate the teaching-learning process. Our college library has a rich collection of text-books, reference books, encyclopaedias, dictionaries, year books, hand books, autobiographies, biographies, thesaurus, etc. It also has a collection of audio cassettes, C.D.s and D.V.D.s. It also has a language lab with **Orell software** installed. The library is well-automated wherein there are OPAC services for searching of books by authors, titles, subjects, etc. It also has INFLIBNET which helps the faculty to gain more information and knowledge in the respective subject. Current awareness is provided through newspaper cuttings, display of new books and journals. The library provides internet facility on 60 terminals. INFLIBNET- NLIST, SMS alert, MOPAC and institutional repository facility is also provided to the users.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The faculty prepares a tentative teaching plan to complete the curriculum within the given time, but sometimes, due to unforeseen circumstances, the faculty might encounter difficulty in completing the curriculum. To overcome the difficulty the faculty engages extra classes. The faculty also engages extra classes for slow learners.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The college has a feedback mechanism for the evaluation of teachers by students. If the feedback about a particular teacher is unsatisfactory, the Principal talks to the concerned teacher about the areas of improvement. The final university examination results are also analysed to plan and improve teaching. The Principal monitors the teaching performance of the faculty and makes timely suggestions. The issue is also discussed in Teacher-Parents meet. The IQAC and the Principal goes through the self appraisal report and calculates the performance of a teacher based on API score, he / she attains. Teachers are motivated to go for seminar / conferences/ refresher courses so as to fulfuill the API socre.

- 2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

The State Government has changed the reservation policy two years back and hence the college faces problems in the recruitment of new teachers. Fourteen posts of assistant professors are lying vacant in the college. The college has earnestly appealed to the university and the Joint Director to give permission to fill up the posts. The Govenment has taken out a G.R. wherin they have mentioned that only 50% of the vacant seats could be filled by seeking permission from the Hon'ble Joint Director. Moreover, a section of the society has gone to the High Court against subject wise reservation. The Hon'ble High Court has issued directions that such appointments will be subject to the decision of the High Court. Hence the college has failed to get NOC from the Hon'ble Joint Director. As soon as the college receives the permission, all the posts would be filled up through duly appointed selection committees. Till then, we have contributory teachers and senior faculty to complete the curriculum.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Yes, the institution has adopted a feedback mechanism for the evaluation of teachers through feed back forms by students . If the feedback about a certain teacher is found to be unsatisfactory, the Principal and the IQAC co-ordinator specifies the areas of improvement so as to bring a change in his / her teaching. The teachers having good performance are always encouraged, while the teachers having average performance are counselled for improvement.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The students are apprised of the evaluation through prospectus, notice board, college website and regular class-room teaching. The students are asked to write correct English and have a clear and legible handwriting. The test and terminal examinations provide them the idea of how the answer-books are evaluated in the exams. Moreover, the teachers give several suggestions for improvement. They are given a clear understanding regarding unitization and pattern of examination. They are also made aware of their right to re-valuation for which the photocopy/ies of the answer-book/s can be obtained and the valuation can be challenged.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The university has brought about a major evaluation reform by promptly declaring the results. There is a central valuation system which is made compulsory for all the teachers. The university has brought about major change also by introducing **semester system and choice-based credit system** at the P.G. level from the session, 2012-13. R.T.M. Nagpur University has issued a notification regarding introducing the semester system for the undergraduate classes. It is applicable to the students going for the first year undergraduate programme from the session 2016-17. The syllabi and curriculums of different programmes have been prepared and planned accordingly. The university has introduced on-screen evaluation from November, 2015.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution always works in accordance with the decisions / reforms taken at the university level. Students are informed about the syllabus, the unitisation and the pattern of examination. They are given model test papers and test examinations are conducted accordingly. The terminal examination gives them a clear idea of the question papers that appear in the final examination.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

The academic aspects are evaluated on the basis of various examinations conducted by the college. Students are encouraged to participate in co-curricular activities. The best participants of NSS and NCC are felicitated with cash prizes, which act as a source of motivation to other students.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightage assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

The institution has Remedial Coaching classes for students weak at English. The teacher forms different clusters of students not only to express their ideas but also to interact in a better way. This aspect of the teacher has brought about a great change in the behaviour of the students and has instilled confidence in them, and has boosted their morale. The face-to-face approach makes the students open up with the teachers. The teachers also come to know about their personal problems or the weaknesses. He works as a facilitator and if possible tries to sort out the problems. Their internal assessment is done on the basis of assignments, seminars, and presentations which they submit in their P.G. classes.

2.5.6 What is the graduate attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The college always promotes qualitative teaching and learning process. It aims at continuous improvement of environment conducive to the pursuit of knowledge and overall development of the students. It encourages all the students to adhere to the highest ethical standards and professional integrity to enhance the satisfaction of all the stakeholders. We want them to develop sensitive and responsible behaviour to transform the society, so that it could emerge as a better, happier and more prosperous place to live in. We want our students to develop themselves morally, spiritually and intellectually so that they become the pillars of the nation. Moral, ethical, civil values are learned by the students during their stay in college. Social pride is inculcated through National Day Celebrations and initiatives taken by the Central and State Govt. Lectures are organized to teach students secular democratic principles by making them aware of the constitution. The students are tought the principles of Gandhian Philosophy like self dependency, need to help others etc.

The students of Home Science department can start small business after their graduation. For example in fields like making Bakery products (buiscuits, cakes, pastry), preservative food (jam, jellies, pickels), garments, dress designing, different types of Rangoli, etc.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

There is a mechanism for the Redressal of grievances at the university level. A student who is not satisfied with the assessment of answer books can challenge the valuation by applying for revaluation wherein a student is entitled to get a photo copy of his answerbooks. In case, he is not satisfied with the marks alloted, he can challenge the valuation and go for revaluation. The Re-assessment is then done by two teachers. In case of the college examination; the students have a direct access to the teacher. He can question the teacher for the under-valuation; and the teachers are expected to give him hints, clues and ideal answers in response. This will certainly help the student to overcome his mistakes and improve his performance. The college has an examination committee that looks after valuation, revaluation, moderation, etc.

Yes, the college clearly states the outcomes of the courses the students offer. The faculty right at the beginning of the session, gives an idea to the students as to what would be the outcome of their learning. They are asked to aim high and work with zeal and commitment so as to attain the ideals they have dremt for. Their whole - hearted participation in the campus and the curiosity to acquire more and more knowledge would make them confident enough to participate in any competititive examination and come out with the flying colours. In the staff council meeting the faculty is informed about the quality of students and are asked to bring the best out of them through devotion and dedication.

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2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

Right at the beginning of the session, the faculty of the college makes their students understand the intended outcomes of their learning. In the staff council meeting the Principal stresses upon the fact that the faculty is responsible for developing the personality of the students by blending knowledge with moral values and ethical discipline. In order to attain the outcome, the faculty organises several interactive meetings among the cluster groups. The faculty gives home assignments, organises debates, discussions, workshops and seminars on a variety of topics, Guest lectures are organised in order to enrich students' knowledge and give them new exposure. Field trips and visits to industries, High Court, State Assembly are organised in order to make the students aware of the prevalent scenario of the nation.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The students of arts are encouraged and motivated to go for competitive examinations, and to have knowledge of ICT to procure better jobs. The Home Science Department gives thrust upon entrepreneurship. They believe in making women self-employed after the completion of their studies. Hence, they are taught the basic skills such as stitching, knitting, embroidery, home-making, dress-designing, beauty techniques, etc. Moreover the college has signed a **MoU with Pee-Vee Textile Jam.** Pee-Vee Textile has around 2400 employees, and the management has agreed to have campus selections for the

Home-Science and Textile students every year. The college also has signed a MoU with Centre for Science and Villages, Dattapur wherein they have agreed to give placements to our students. The faculty of Law has a great exposure. Several of our students have been selected as district judges and have risen to the level of High Court judges. Many of them are practising advocates and have made a name in their fields. Some of them have even joined public services. The postgraduates of Humanities generally prefer to join as assistant professors / teachers in different institutions. Hundreds of our students are Assistant and Associate Professors in different colleges. Students doing M.Sc. Textile and Clothing prefer to join textile industry and fashion designing. The college has been recognized as a Centre for Higher Learning and Research in five subjects by RTM Nagpur University. The research study in the relevant disciplines shall certainly help to enhance socio-economic status of the people. The collaboration with different company / organisations has been done so as to make our students visit the companies for apprenticeship / Internship. The experts from the industry visit the college and thus the students get exposure of different industries. The knowledge of the industry experts is of great use for the students in future.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyse data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The student learning outcomes are collected from the university results. The Principal and IQAC make an analysis of the results and place it before the Local Managing Committee for the measures to be taken to overcome the barriers of learning. The Local Management committee, after a discussion, suggests certain measures, e.g. inclusion of tutorials and remedial coaching classes, etc. If needed, memorandums are issued to the concerned teachers to improve their performance. The assessment of the feedback received from the students is taken care of. Necessary action is taken wherever needed.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

Once the student leaves the college, it is extremely difficult to monitor the outcome of the learning. We come to know about them only through alumni meets where the achievements of our old students are discussed. The college invites such achievers to address the students so as to motivate them. Now the college has put the alumni registration form on the college website so that the passout students can enrol themselves and mention the achievement of their learning outcomes. The learning outcomes of the current students are discussed in the LMC and Staff Council meetings. Action is taken as per the relevant suggestions received in this regard.

2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples. Any other relevant information regarding Teaching-Learning and Evaluation which the college would like to include.

Yes, the institution and the individual teacher make use of evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating the students. Every student is under continuous observation and the teacher takes a note of their academic and co-curricular level. For example, if a student is found good at oratory and has debating skills, he is asked to participate in debates and declamations. The students good at music are made to participate in University level Yuvarang competition. Such participation not only makes them win the awards but also boost their confidence. When the students realise that they are able to pass positive messages to the society through street plays, the participations of the students is on increase.

The measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of the research schemes / projects are as below:-

- 1. The Principal investigator is given autonomy under the policy framed by IQAC and research committee.
- 2. Resources are made available to the faculty, as and when required.
- 3. He is provided with necessary institutional infrastructure and technical assistance.
- 4. He is also allowed to make use of library after working hours.
- 5. If needed, his periods are adjusted as per his needs. Special leave is granted to him on request, provided the Principal is convinced about his ongoing research activity.
- 6. The college makes every effort to enrich the labs with modern instruments and ICT facility.
- 7. The Heads of the departments have been provided with a laptop each, which has facilitated research.
- 8. The college has Reliance 4G Wi-Fi system and INFLIBNET-NLIST facility.
- 9. The institution extends all kind of support to the researchers and submits utilization certificate to U.G.C.
- 10. Several of our faculty members have attended Refresher courses on Research Methodology.
- 11. The Institution has organized a 60 hour Course Work in the month of August, 2015 on Research Methodology so as to facilitate the on- going researchers.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

Following efforts have been undertaken by the institution to develop scientific temper, research culture and aptitude among students.

- 1. The P.G. students are given project work so as to develop and encourage research aptitude among students.
- 2. Programmes on different social issues like female foeticide, pre-marital counsellling, etc. are organized to develop a scientific temper. Street plays are also written and presented for this purpose.
- 3. The Home Economics and Home Science Departments adopt innovative techniques in creating new fashions in Textile and Clothing and food items, which is requisite for creating a research culture among students.
- 3.1.5 Give details of the faculty involvement in active research (Guiding student research, leading Research Projects, engaged in individual/collaborative research activity, etc.

The faculty is actively involved in research activities.12 members of the faculty are Ph.D. Supervisors. One faculty member has completed Major Research Project and 10 faculty members have completed Minor Research Projects. Two Faculty members have ongoing minor research projects. Sri Hari Aney.

Four members of the faculty have utilized sabbatical leave /FIP leave for their research and M.Phil work. Most of the faculty members performed their research work after the completion of teaching hours and during summer and winter vacations. The library and laboratories are kept open for their research activities.

3.1.10 Provide details of the initiatives taken up by the institution in creating awareness/advocating/transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community (lab to land)

Following initiatives have been taken up by the institution in creating awareness of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community:-

1. Dr. A.G. Pawade's thesis was on the topic "Rights of Minority in India: A critical and analytical study in the light of decisions of the Supreme Court and High Courts. The study conducted has a direct bearing on the social structure of India. Though the constitution under article 28 and 29 specifically empowers the minorities in India to have fundamental rights in the matters of their culture and for that purpose can even establish educational institutions, but the question arises how far such institution can be independent in administration? Dr. Pawade has spoken about the existing law applicable to such institutions which can be a ready reckoner for any minority educational institution. Through this study a minority institution can know as to

- how far it is independent in designing, regarding the procedure for admission, appointment of staff, service conditions, etc.
- 2. Dr. R.K. Mor's thesis entitled "A critical analysis of Law relating to preventive detention in India" carries much public importance in the light of increase in terrorist activist world over. The Law which provides for preventing detention is always questioned by the human rights champions as a threat to personal liberty. Dr. R. K. Mor effectively summarizes the position taken by the judiciary while evoking preventive detention against any individual who is suspected to be involved in terrorist activities like TADA, POTA or unlaw activity prevention act.
- 3. Dr. M.N. Bendle submitted his thesis "Dimensions to right to life and personal liberty under article 21 of the constitution of India". The study conducted by him has much public utility and social relevance. The right to life and personal liberty is most essential basic human right in democratic society. It is the most fundamental right guaranteed by the constitution. His research work provides crystal clear idea about liberty to one and all.
- 4. The Home Science Department has worked on conversion of kitchen waste into organic manure. The waste is collected in the pit and water is left in it resulting into small scale of compost. This can generate income and bring economic upliftment. It also creates environmental consciousness among the people.

In a similar way, the Home Science or Home Economics researcher doing her research on a subject of Fashion Designing might have to take the help of the department of Textile and Clothing, At such a time the faculty of these departments sit

together to frame a questionnaire and help each other wherever required. For example the department of Geography, History, Law and English have come together to run a four week short term course in Tourism.

The research facilities available to students and research scholars within the campus are as follows:-

- The Home Science department has well-equipped and separate laboratories for Chemistry, Food & Nutrtion, Physics, etc.

- Laptops have been distributed to all the Heads of the department to facilitate Teaching and Research.

During the last few years the college had received grants for the renovation of Home Econoincs and Home Science laboratories.

3.5.2 What is the stated policy of the institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized?

The institution has stated policy to promote consultancy, though not much publicity has been done so far. Most of the times consultancy has been given to the Govt. offices and NGOs free of cost. The institution is thinking of going for paid consultancy in near future.

3.5.3 How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?

The institution encourages the staff to give its consultancy services to the government organizations, sister concerns, schools, etc. The law faculty is allowed to give consultancy to the co- operative sector and NGOs. Severals of our teachers are appointed as member / chairmans of the Local Enquiry Committee. Many works as VC's nominee / subject expert on the selection committees of the newly recruited teachers. As the Princiapal of the college is the member of the management council, he has been heading several committees of the university for past five years.

3.5.4 List the broad areas and major consultancy services provided by the institution and the revenue generated during the last four years.

The Department of English and the Department of Marathi have been providing consultancy services to the District Collectorate for setting up question papers and evaluating them. As it is a government organisation, the District Collectorate does not pay any revenue for the services rendered. The Law faculty also provides consultancy services as a matter of charity to the sister concerns. The Language Lab has provided consultancy to the Teachers of Ramabai Convent, Wardha and the revenue received was Rs. 5000/-.

3.5.5 What is the policy of the institution in sharing the income generated through consultancy (staff involved: Institution) and its use for institutional development?

The policy of the institution in sharing the income generated is of 60:40. The institution keeps forty percent of the money as the rent and for further development; whereas sixty percent of the money is disbursed among the faculty members who generate the revenue.

3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighbourhood-community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

The college has always maintained a healthy and positive relationship with its neighbouring community. The college, through NSS unit, has organised camps in

villages and different communities. Programmes of health and hygiene, AIDS awareness, balanced nutrition, importance of breast feeding, cleanliness, etc. are taken up in camps. The community is made aware of the evils of the society through street plays. Importance of Mahila Bachat Gat in every village is emphasized skills about designing garments, artificial flowers, small money purses, etc. are shared with the villagers, so that they can become financially independent. The college also has adopted Karanji Bhoge, a village which is 10 kilometer away from the campus. Thus, NCC, NSS, Centre for women's studies and services prepare the students for social commitment. They are taught not only social values but also how to live in symbiotic environment.

NCC Programme: - The NCC programme instils in its cadets a sense of discipline, a feeling of patriotism and respect for citizens.

- Through NCC camps, students from different castes, communities and economic classes come together on common platform.
- During the stay in the camp, they develop a feeling of brotherhood among the students, inculcate good habits, develop leadership qualities and improve the overall personality.

Centre for Women's studies and services and Population Education Club:-

- Centre for Women's studies and services addresses different health and social issues related to women.
- Population Education Club creates awareness among the society regarding the population explosion, its effects and measures for controlling the population.

The Value Based Programmes:-The institution has organized value based spiritual lectures of eminent personalities for teaching moral values and self-discipline among the students which ultimately results into holistic development of students.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

The institution promotes students' participation in extension activities such as NSS, NCC, PEC, CWS, etc. The NSS unit organizes camps, awareness and philanthropic activities. The college also collaborates with NGOs like Nisarga Seva Samiti, Lion's Club, etc. to promote the healthy atmosphere in the community. Students' council elections are held every year to elect the students' representatives. The students' representatives try to address student – related issues at the college and university level, thus developing the leadership qualities. The students are encouraged to participate in rallies against social issues such as corruption, and crimes against women, etc. National Days are celebrated in the college campus along with the students so that there is a feeling of patriotism. The birth centenaries and death anniversaries of national leaders are also celebrated in the college so as to bring in a vision of selfless dedication towards the country.

Through them the institution comes to know about the problems faced by the villagers. The textile students of our college are sent to Morarji Mill, Butibori and Pee-Vee Textile, Jam for their internship In 2011 the institution has received special grants of Rs. 60,000/- from Lanco Industries, Mandava providing scholarship to the law students.. The college has involved itself with various local bodies like Nisarga Seva Samiti, Rotary club, Mahatma Gandhi Sevagram Vichar Parishad and Nayantara. The community and villages are benefitted by the social activities performed by students.

The management tries to update the facilities every year

- 1. Our institution has augmented its infrastructure significantly in the last four years. There has been renovation of Staff Rooms, Office, Principal's Office, Seminar Hall, Classrooms of the ground floor in the main building. All these rooms are fitted with vitrified tiles and with modern electrical amenities.
- 2. The Foundation stone for a separate Law college building has been laid down by our Chairman Prof. Suresh Deshmukh.
- 3. There has been extension of the library building. A separate wing has been attached to the main library so as to hold more stack of books.
- 4. The office and staff room have been completely renovated making them spacious.
- 5. A new well-furnished washroom has been constructed for the girl students.
- 6. Ramps have been created in each building for the differently-abled students.
- 7. A basketball ground with high mast lights (Flood Light) has been constructed as per International Standards.
- 8. A huge compound wall of 640 mtrs. has been constructed all around the campus to keep it free from the outside noise and disturbances.
- 9. We have future plan of constructing a gymnasium and a well-built Canteen for the students. Proposal for the gymnasium has already been sent to the UGC for seeking permission.
- 10. We also have a future plan to construct new classrooms and laboratories for the Home Science department. Proposals for constructing new classrooms and laboratories have been sanctioned by the UGC. We are waiting for the release of fund under XII plan by UGC.

The college has a Boy's hostel and a Girl's hostel with a capacity of 60 and 50 students respectively. But from last few years the students have not applied for hostel accommodation for the reason that there are better transport facilities and it is convenient for them to commute from their villages. Moreover, there are government hostels for the backward classes where they are given free lodging and boarding facilities. Hence, the students belonging to backward class categories prefer to stay in those hostels. The management and the Yeshwant Rural Education Society have taken a decision to run Ramabai School in the hostel premises.



As the college is a member of IFLIBNET N-list programme, students and the faculty can use the resources in and off the campus. Apart from these facilities, Library has MOPAC app services by which any user can search his bibliographic record through smart phone from anywhere.

The institution is always in the favour of upgradation of IT infrastructure. Though college office has CMS and Library has LIBMAN software, these software are upgraded every year as per the need. The college has installed 4G Wi-Fi system in the college campus. Classrooms are made ICT friendly. Classrooms have been well-equipped with Interactive Boards and LCD projectors. In future, institution is committed to improve its ICT infrastructure as per requirement.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

The college has maintenance committee which supervises the instruements, gadgets and take steps to maintain them. Equipments are maintained by the supplier for a year or two. Later on, their services are utilised for maintenance. Internet and Wi-Fi are maintained by BSNL and Reliance. Computers are maintained by a local software engineer. The college has an agreement signed with Asha Computers, Wardha regarding the yearly maintainence of the computers. The management committee looks after the maintenance of college building and premises. College has AMC with Master Software, Nagpur for CMS and LIBMAN software and Fusion Technology, Nagpur for Website upgradation.

The instruments are checked for precision before their use in practicals. In case of errors, they are repaired by the company professionals.

Following steps have been taken for maintaining sensitive equipment:-

- The institution has three inverters, one online inverter and a generator of 25KV to ensure the constant and smooth electricity supply.
- UPS have been provided to some of the computers.
- Constant water supply is maintained through overhead water tanks.
- The laboratories are provided with exhaust fans, water taps, etc.

- m) Free legal aids are provided by the law department.

The impact of the festival is manifold – the students learn to run the food stall, sell different articles like greetings, mobile covers, small purses, tie and dye dupattas. By doing so, they learn the art of business and come to know about the likes and dislikes of the customers.

Winners in games and sports are given prizes in the annual prize distribution ceremony which is held in the month of Januarry every year. A Quiz Contest is conducted every year by the department of law.

The department of Psychology delivers lecture for both staff and students on stress management and time management, and helps in choosing professional career.

5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

The faculty members encourage and provide academic support to the U.G. students to seek admission to P. G. courses and motivate them for higher learning and research such as M. Phil., Ph. D, etc. Students are made aware of higher learning and the employment opportunities through career counselling and placement cell. The students are informed that they have a bright future awaiting them after post graduation programme, hence they need to give 100% participation as it would be a deciding factor in their life. Advertisements related to employment and higher learning are displayed on the library notice board. Even the passout students are allowed to utilise the library facilities till the time they get employment. They are also involved in the speeches given by motivational speakers. Moreover, once the student seeks admission in XI standard, he has the opportunity for vertical development. He can go for his graduation, post graducation and continue his Ph.D. programme under the same roof of our institute. Students have the facility of paying their tution fees in instalments as per their convenience.

The drop-out rate of the college is around 6% at the U.G. level, and 8% at the P.G. level. However, extra time is devoted by the faculty to the weak students. The college runs remedial coaching classes for such students. Teacher-Parent meet also helps in solving the problems of students in completing their programmes. If some of the students are found to be too poor to pay the tutition fees due to financial constraints, such financially weak students are granted concession in fees and they are also granted Book Bank facility.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

Our management is committed to provide education to the rural masses. The local management council is chaired by the President of Yeshwant Rural Education Society. The Local Management Council has three faculty members and one from non-teaching faculty. The Principal is an ex-officio secretary to the Local Management Council. It is he who frames the progressive policy to serve all its stake-holders. LMC elections are held after every five years. The institution ensures the quality in teaching-learning process. The Management encourages upgradation of teaching skills, research works, student-friendly activities, etc. The Management has exercised a leadership role by bringing effective and efficient transaction of learning process through Internal Quality Assurance Cell. The institution has already completed two cycles of accreditation in 2004 and 2010; and is now committed to go for the third.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

The Principal, being the Head of the institution, monitors all the academic and administrative activities of the college. He ensures that all the norms and guidelines of Rashtrasant Tukdoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur are followed. The activities related to the mission are discussed with the staff for effective execution. The Principal appoints committees to ensure the smooth functioning of the college.

The Principal has interaction with the teaching and non-teaching staff through staff council meeting and staff club meetings. Feedback is taken from teachers, students and parents to make the institution more effective and accountable. The infrastructure of the college is used to the optimum- right from 7.30 a.m. till 8.00 p.m. Periodic meetings of different committees are held by the Principal to discuss the difficulties faced. The staff representatives give suggestions in LMC for bringing in a quality improvement. The institution also arranges study tours and picnics to bring in research culture and academic excellence among students.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The policies and plans are framed by the management and the Principal with the support and involvement of the staff members. The management is keen on involving them for the effectiveness of administration. There is also an internal quality assurance cell which monitors the overall progress of the different committees and renders suggestions and provides help to them. The feasible suggestions from faculty and alumni are also accepted to bring in a better change.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The institution takes every step to provide academic leadership to the faculty. The session begins with the Staff Council Meeting wherein different committees are formed and the teachers are made aware of their respective committees. The periodical meetings are taken up by the Principal in order to study the programmes prepared by the committees. The college also has a staff club which has a meeting on every Wednesday. A teaching Staff member is supposed to read out a research or innovative paper on any topic, promoting interaction within the members. This also helps in boosting their academic confidence and making them aware of the social responsibilities. The teachers are permitted to contest for different bodies of the university. Many of our teachers have been the member of BOS, SENATE, Faculty, Academic Council, and Management Council which is a strong proof of our Academic Leadership. Dr. V.A. Deshmukh, Principal of the college, is a member to the Management Council, and also the Chairman of board of studies in Human Development in R.T.M. Nagpur University, Nagpur. He is an Executive Member to Association of Indian College Principals. He is also a member of the Advisory Board for Bor Forest Sanctuary. Dr. V.B. Dhone has been elected as the vice president of Maharashtra Federation of University and College Teachers' organization for the third time.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The college has adopted a participatory and inclusive approach in administration. Work is achieved through delegation of duties and authority. The college endeavours to groom leadership at various levels. The staff members are groomed by assigning them with different committees. The Staff Club activity of presenting a paper also grooms them for national or international seminars; or for publishing their papers in the journals. The students are groomed for leadership qualities through various extra-curricular activities like essay competition, debates, elocution, Sugam sangeet Competition, Dance competition, various exhibitions, through NCC, NSS and sport activities. These activities not only boost the confidence but also help them to imbibe leadership qualities. Many of our teachers have represented senate, academic council, management council, faculties, board of studies, etc. which are the point-indicators of their leadership qualities.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The college delegates authority and provides operational autonomy to the various departments and the committees ensuring decentralised governance system in the following manner:-

The members of the faculty are given autonomy to purchase books and to go for research work or for higher education, as per their choice. They are permitted to prepare their own teaching plan and execute it with the help of ICT. The librarian is given autonomy to develop and enhance the library, while the sports department is free to procure different equipments as and when required. All this autonomy given to the faculty helps in enhancing governance system and makes the mission feasible.

Yes, the college promotes the culture of participative management. Two teachers from the teaching staff and one from non-teaching staff represent the local management committee. The committee further takes decisions and provides suggestion for the academic development. The institution promotes the participation of teachers in Teacher-Parent and Alumni meet and in IQAC planning and execution. The general secretary of the Students Council is also involved in the various extra-curricular activities that take place in the college.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

Yes, the institution has a formally stated quality policy as under:-

The college has voluntarily undergone two cycles of NAAC accreditation. The institution prepares annual prospective plan which can be divided into three broad categories:-

6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.


Yes, the institution has a perspective plan for the development. Following aspects are considered in LMC and Staff Council Meetings:-

- To upgrade the institution by bringing in PG courses and centre for Higher Learning and research.
- Establishing network with govt. and non-govt. organisations like MGIRI, Centre for Villages,Pee Vee Textile, etc
- To develop library and laboratories as centres for higher learning and research
- To encourage faculty to do Ph.D. and register themselves as Ph.D. supervisors.
- To undertake major and minor research projects in every department.
- To start vocational courses that would make the students stand on their own feet.
- To start a course in Tourism enabling the students to become guides / receptionists.
- To build a separate infrastructure for the Law courses giving it a separate identity.
- To organize National and State level conferences, seminars and workshops.
- To start add-on and bridge courses.

• To become Electrically independent by switching over to the use of Solar-Energy.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

Following is the internal organizational structure of the institution:-



The Principal plans the policy as per the directions given by the LMC and the policy is conveyed to the HODs and the Coordinators, and the policy is implemented through HODs, Coordinator and the faculty members. The feedback is taken from time to time to execute the policy in a better way. The policies are monitored by the Principal and the IQAC Coordinator.

 - The Recruitment in the college takes place on the basis of merit, as per the guidelines laid down by U.G.C. and State Government.

per the State Government rules. The Staff is provided with internet facility, medical reimbursement, leave travel concession, maternity leave, etc.

The Principal and the members of the grievance redressal committee analyse the grievances and take necessary steps to resolve them. Moreover, Student Council meetings are held whereby the grievances can be heard and resolved through discussions.

- Training programmes are also held for Non-teaching staff.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The following are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff.

- Internet facility for the staff.
- Medical re-imbursement facility.
- Leave travel concession.
- Duty leave for attending orientation/refresher/short-term courses / seminars / conferences / workshops, etc.
- Promote faculty to undertake Ph.D. and become Ph.D. supervisors.

Apart from these facilities, the college management has made every effort to give a facelift to the college by providing better working conditions. Besides, the Heads of the departments are provided with laptops, so that they can promote use of ICT in teaching-learning.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The institution undertakes the following efforts in order to develop the staff professionally.

- Promotes the faculty to attend orientation / refresher/ short-term courses/ seminars/conferences/ workshops, etc.
- Promotes the faculty to write, publish and present research papers.
- Promotes faculty to undertake major and minor research projects.
- Arranges computer training programmers in order to spread ICT awareness among the staff.
- Promotes staff to be the members on the important bodies of the university like Senate, Academic Council, Faculties, Boards of Studies, Professional bodies, etc.
- 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The college follows regular practice of using API system for the assessment of the faculty as suggested by the U.G.C. The student feedback is also considered while assessing the performance of a teacher. Shortcomings if any, are conveyed to the concerned teacher so that he can overcome his / her shortcomings and improve his / her teaching ability. The self appraisal forms are filled up by every staff member every year, the Principal goes through them and writes the confidential report regarding the concerned teacher.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The review of the performance appraisal reports is taken up by the management. The strengths and weaknesses are identified and discussed, and decisions are taken accordingly for future improvements. Such decisions are conveyed to the faculty members through the Principal.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The college runs a credit co-operative store having 109 members at present, which is named as Grahak Bhandar. It has a share capital of Rs. 31500/- and a reserve fund of

Rs. 36,343/-. The Net profit for the year 2014-15 was Rs. 17,936/- The aim of the store is to provide stationary, grains, household appliances, food items, etc. at reasonable rates. The college also runs a canteen in the college premises to provide refreshment to the staff and students. The college also has a credit cooperative society which has 192 members at present. It has Rs. 5,00,000/- as share capital of share holders. The loan distributed to the members is Rs. 6,70,000/- This society provides a personal loan to the tune of Rs. 3 lac to the employees.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The institution attempts to provide a cohesive work culture to its faculty. The new recruitment takes place as per U.G.C. guidelines. The college provides necessary infrastructure and research facilities. Leave and financial assistance is provided for the teachers' participation in academic activities. The institution has a democratic and an amicable atmosphere and hence once the person is appointed, he wishes to retain himself in the institute unless he gets an opportunity to go a higher post. The staff members not only receive several facilities but also enjoy liberty in several matters.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The Annual Budget under various heads is prepared every year wherein the budgetary provisions are mentioned. The audited Balance Sheet of the previou year is also kept in the LMC meeting for the consideration and approval. The Local Management Committee takes decisions regarding the use of financial resources. There is also a purchase committee which takes decision in these matters such as calling of tenders, quality control; effectiveness of the price is taken care of. The institutional receipts are properly deposited and utilized for the benefit of students. The funds received from various agencies are utilised for the purpose it was generated. The whole exercise is student oriented – by it we mean that we wish to give optimum to the students from the funds generated.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The institution has a regular prescribed mechanism for internal and external audit. The services of the Mahajan and Company, Amravati are hired by the institution for the internal audit. This is meticulously done every year. The last internal audit was done in August, 2015. The objections raised were of minor nature and were promptly complied with. The state government through the office of the Joint Director, Higher Education, Nagpur does the external audit every year.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and

administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with, institutions, if any.

The institution gets 100% salary grants from the state government towards the salary of the permanent teaching and non-Teaching staff. Apart from the state government, it receives grants form bodies like U.G.C.

In case there is a deficit, the Management makes the provision to meet the deficit. The reserve fund of the college is Rs 2,25,000.

6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The institution keeps a watch to receive additional funds from different agencies like U.G.C, State Government, etc. Last year, the institution received a prize of Rs. 50,000/-as the second best college in the State Government programme called 'Jagar Janivancha Abhiyaan' instituted by the Government of Maharashtra, which aimed to bring awareness among women.

Yes, the institution has established IQAC on 24.7.2006

- (a) The institution has a policy for quality assurance which ensures continuous improvement in the faculty, students and the various activities. The cell suggests possible measures to be taken in the next academic session. It is brought to the notice of the management, so that there can be further improvement in the infrastructure. Interaction among teachers and students is arranged so as to overcome the shortcomings and personal difficulties faced by the students.
- (b) The decisions proposed by the IQAC have been approved and implemented as given below:-
 - (i) Remedial coaching classes for slow learners.
 - (ii) Digitalization of library.
 - (iii) Emphasis on teachers' research.
 - (iv) Automation of office.
 - (v) Applying for centre for Higher learning and Research to the university in the subjects of History, Political Science, Psychology, Law and Textile and Clothing.
 - (vi) Increasing the periodicals and journals in the library.
 - (vii)The IQAC has nominated two external members on its committee. Dr. Prafulla Kale, who is the Director of Mahatma Gandhi Institute for Rural Industry (MGIRI), a central govt. project and who has brought about radical change in his own campus, is member of IQAC. He is an academician par excellence and an astute scientist who has served Panjabrao Krishi Vidyapeeth, Akola for more than thirty years. His knowledge and experience has brought him several laurels. During the last two years, he has been able to get six patents for MGIRI. Several villages and needy people are given vocational training so as to make them stand on their own feet. He is a postgraduate from P.A.U. Ludhiana and has his Ph.D. degree from I.I.T. Kharagpur. He has presented and published several papers at National and International conferences. He is recipient of several awards. Some of them are:
 - 1) Vikas Ratna Award in 1998 at the hands of Hon'ble Defence Minister.
 - 2) Radha Krishna Shanti Award for outstanding Research in the field of Agriculture in 2010.
 - 3) Magnum foundation Award for outstanding research in the field of Agriculture in 2011.
 - 4) Bharat Krishak Samaj Award for outstanding extension work in Net house Technology in 2012.
 - He was also a member of different State and National Committees and has visited different countries on behalf of the govt. His contribution towards Wardha and nation as a whole is significant.

Another external member in the cell is Dr. Rammohan S. Baindur who is known for his contribution towards yoga. He is M.Sc. in Physics and Chemistry and has a doctorate in Chemistry. He has worked in Khadi and Village Industry Commission for 30 years in different capacities. He was the Deputy Director and Director of Khadi and Village Industries Commission Mumbai, Chennai, Jaipur. He was also the Director of Bee-Keeping, Food and Vegetable Processing Industry, Mumbai. He has started 32 Ambar Charkha Centres in Maharashtra. He has also worked as Secretary to the Centre of Science and Villages. He was the President of Sanskar Bharti, Wardha for over 10 years. He has given employment to thousands of unemployed youth and women. His mission is to serve the rural people.

- (c) The institution is of the confirmed opinion that unless the institution is student centric, there can be no quality enhancement. Student council is constituted every year to help the institute to work in a meaningful manner for the quality enhancement; and the feedback and suggestions given by the students and alumni representatives are discussed and implemented.
- (d) Internal Quality Assurance Cell comprises of members from the different constituents of the institution, for example senior faculty, non-teaching staff, and management representatives. The IQAC communicates its decisions to the staff through the staff council meetings held at least twice a year.
- 6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

Yes, the institution is well aware of the fact that the future of the students is directly proportional to qualitative development of the institution. 7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Yes, the institution conducts a green audit of its campus. The campus has around 125 big and 30 small trees surrounding the campus. The institution identifies the activities to be undertaken, for example, tree plantation, eradication of congress grass, weeds, etc. The institution has made a provision for water harvesting. The institution tries to implement these programmes through extension activities. The staff and students voluntarialy work in order to have a lush green campus. Nature points are also displayed on Wall Magazines so as to arouse keen interest of students in nature.

- 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly? The institution has taken significant initiatives to make its campus eco-friendly.
 - Energy conservation
 - Use of renewable energy
 - Water harvesting
 - Efforts for Carbon neutrality
 - Plantation
 - Hazardous waste management
 - e-waste management

The institution has taken significant initiatives to make its campus eco-friendly. The college believes in the principle of 'Green Campus, Clean Campus'. Tree Plantation programme is organised on 15th of August every year to achieve this end. Attempts have been made to make the campus pollution-free so that there is an ideal atmosphere for academic pursuits.

Energy Conservation:-

The institution conserves energy in the following manner:-

- Classrooms are ventilated and have significant natural light which minimises the use of electricity.
- Use of C.F.L. and L.E.D. bulbs
- Compost Preparation: The institution prepares organic manures in the form of compost. It is prepared out of eradicated congress grass / weeds, dry leaves of plants, twigs and branches of the trees after the pruning is done.
- Water Harvesting: The rain water from the roofs of the building is collected through pipes and is stored in nearby pits and thus water-harvesting is done.
 - Check Dam Construction: NSS camps are organised once in a year. Our students take up an activity to conserve the water by constructing check dams where they use sacks filled with sands to check the water flow.
- Efforts for carbon Neutrality: Witnessing the problem of pollution in Delhi where there was a great increase in Carbon monoxide, Sulphur dioxoide, Nitrogen oxide, etc., the institution has decided to go for a No-Vehicle Day. The Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff has decided to observe every Saturday as a No-Vehicle Day. The students also are intimated regarding the decision so that they also can give full cooperation in making Wardha a pollution free-city. The students are encouraged to

come on bicycles or on foot and save the atmosphere from getting polluted.

- Plantation: The institution undertakes the following types of plantations:-
- Energy tree plantation
- Teak, Ashoka plantation
- Fencing plantation
- Lawns
- Hazardous Waste Management
- Chemical solutions are properly dissipated after practicals.
- The use of hazardous chemicals are minimised / replaced.
- The college has installed a **11 KV Solar Power Plants** which includes 315 watt panel multiplied by 35 numbers solar panel which has made the college self sufficient regarding the electric energy. We have also decided to sell the stored energy to the Maharashtra Electricity Board.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

Following are some of the innovative measures undertaken by the institution to create a positive impact on the functioning of the college:

- The institution has promoted the staff to participate in seminars, conferences, workshops, etc. It has promoted the faculty to undertake major and minor research projects. It has motivated the faculty to undertake publication of research papers and books.
- Promoted audio-visual teaching aids for better understanding of the topics.
- The college organises study tours, industrial visits, visit to assembly and parliament, etc. for the students to get supplementary knowledge.
- The college conducts remedial coaching classes in English to promote the academic standard of the rural students.
- The college organises extracurricular activities in order to develop the latent talent of the students.
- The college organises a Home Science festival in which the students can sell their products. They thus receive the first-hand knowledge of marketing.
- Several competitions such as debates, quiz, singing and dance competitions are organised to identify the new talent and to give boost to their confidence.
- Flower Exhibition, Cooking Competition, Dress Making, Knitting, Embroidery, handicraft, rangoli, etc are organised to give scope to the latent talent of the students.
- The institution has promoted the use of technology by computerising the library and has provided Wi-Fi connection everywhere in the campus so that the students can search additional reference material related to their subjects in their curriculum.
- The college collaborates with N.G.Os like Nisarga Seva Samiti, Rotary Club, Lions Club, Sewagram Ashram to make the environment clean and eco-friendly.
- The institution has got the university recognised centre for higher learning and research in five of its departments, which is quite encouraging and motivating for the students to do research work in the institution.
- The NCC and NSS students conduct the diagnostic camps for the detection of Sickle cells, anaemia, blood groups etc.

- CCTV cameras are installed which have brought about a discipline among the students and checked untoward incidents taking place in the college premises. It has also helped in the smooth conduct of examination and administration.
- Awareness is created through the street plays based on AIDS, population explosion, liquor prohibition, etc. The posters on these subjects are displayed in the campus.



Best Practice - I

- 1. **Title of the practice**:- Yeshwant Scholarship
- 2. **Goal**:- The objectives in starting this practice were as follow:
 - To attract more admission flow.
 - To attract meritorious students of H.S.C. to join our institution.
 - To help students financially so that they can purchase books and reading material.
 - To receive this scholarship, attendance is compulsory; hence it would not only improve the attendance, but would also boost their confidence and act as a motivational factor in their academic pursuits.
 - This scholarship is open to all irrespective of caste, category or financial status of parents.
 - 3. **Context**:-Students coming to our institution are from the rural areas. Many of them work as labourers in the fields. They suffer financial crisis and hence they are not regular to their classes. Hence, the Principal, the teaching and non- teaching faculty and the retired faculty of the college came together and decided to raise a corpus fund with the help of which the students would be benefitted.
- 4. **Practice**: The teaching faculty voluntarily decided to contribute Rs. 500/- and the non-teaching faculty Rs. 100/- per month for the fund from the year 2011. The retired staff has also contributed Rs. 10,000/-each as seed money for the corpus fund to the tune of Rs. 1,80,000. As a result, we have been able to bring students out of financial crisis. This endeavour has not only increased the student flow, but also the attendance of the students. The table given below clearly indicates the number of students benefitted by this practice and the amount spent, apart from the government scholarship the students get. Moreover, these meritorious students have come in contact with the scholarship disbursing committee which gives personal attention to them and motivates them to perform better. They can have a face-to-face interaction with the committee members where they can speak about their problems. The committee members take steps to find solution to their problems. Moreover, the committee members also suggest reference books for their further reading so as to enhance their personality.

With the inception of this practice, we have been able to cover even those students who are not covered under the government scholarship. The scholarship has boosted the morale of the students and motivated them to do better in their academic pursuit and has ultimately aroused their interest in studies. Automatically, the percentage of attendance in such classes has also gone up.

6. **Problems:**- In the first meeting, some of the members of staff had apprehensions regarding the success of this project and hence they were a bit reluctant to voluntarily donate money for this endeavour; but when the outcome was seen, even the retired faculty came up voluntarily to give a helping hand. Today, we do not have any problem in raising this fund, and the teaching and non-teaching faculty take pride for having helped the students in this manner. Apart from this, the faculty of Home Science Department raises a fund in order to help the students. The students of this faculty are provided free railway and bus passes to commute from their villages

Best Practice –II

- 1. **Title**:- Activities Undertaken by Yeshwant Staff Club
- 2. **Goal**: Yeshwant Staff club, Wardha was established in the year 1968 by Prof. G.B. Kadam who was the Principal of the college and had served in the military forces and, later on, went on to become the Vice-Chancellor of Nagpur University, Nagpur. This club was started with several aims in the mind. The objectives of starting the club are given below:-
 - To develop the academic orientation of the faculty.
 - To boost the morale of the faculty and motivate them in the field of research.
 - To create a congenial homely atmosphere among the management, the Principal and the teaching and non-teaching faculty.
 - To felicitate the meritorious children of the faculty.
 - To felicitate the incoming and outgoing faculty, and welcome newly married brides / bridegrooms into Yeshwant family.
- 3. **The Context:-** Principal G.B. Kadam wanted every faculty member to work as a family member so that everyone would be sincere, committed and devoted to his work. Moreover, inclusion of new brides / bridegrooms in Yeshwant family would give them a new exposure and instil in them a confidence that their spouse is working in a healthy and congenial atmosphere. An employee working in such an atmosphere would not only get the job satisfaction; but also would be sincere and committed to the work.
- 4. The Practice: Yeshwant Staff Club organises several activities benefitting the staff members. Foremost among them is the practice of reading out a research / informative paper on every Wednesday. The paper reading programmes begin with a medical health awareness programme. Teachers are given advance information regarding the dates of paper reading programme. The title and theme of paper is displayed on the notice board and on muster. After the paper presentation, there is a lively discussion. Arguments and counter-arguments are made for and against the paper. It becomes the duty of the paper reader to defend the ideas or the principles which he has propounded. Thus the paper reader comes to understand the shortcomings of his paper, moreover he gets a better insight and perception to develop his ideas as the paper has been discussed among all the staff members. This exercise can also instil confidence in the paper reader. The staff club also runs an activity wherein the incoming and outgoing faculty is felicitated. Moreover, the faculty members who are awarded Ph.D. degree, faculty getting appointed on important posts, awards and social recognitions and the outgoing staff are felicitated in the programme. The newly married couples are also felicitated at the hands of the management. All the retired faculty along with their families are also invited for this programme. The staff club arranges two such programmes every year which are followed by dinner.
- 5. **Evidence of Success**: The activity, run by Yeshwant Staff club, Wardha, instils a sense of confidence among the teaching and non-teaching faculty. It also gives job satisfaction. Moreover, the spouses come to have a confirmed opinion that the institution is like a big family wherein there is love, affection and 'fellow feeling'. He / She is ready to allow him / her to spare more time in such a cosy atmosphere. Such a congenial atmosphere gives a sense of job satisfaction to the employees and they

become sincere and devoted to the institution. Even the Management authorities freely interact with the families of the staff members giving the whole gathering a homely atmosphere. The success of the practice can be seen in the commitment and devotion of the employees for their work.

Strength:

We have highly qualified, experienced and well trained faculties who constitute our strength. We regularly screen plays and train our students in language lab in listening, speaking, reading and writing skills. Our demonstrative lectures involve students in learning activity. Availability of the infra-structure of Internet, Laptops, PPTs, Auditorium, English Language Lab, and Interactive Boards definitely enhance the English learning process. Activities of English Literary Association and Remedial English Classes provide substantial support to students in learning language skills.

Weaknesses:

The main impediment of our students in mastering English language skills is "their poverty & rural background. Other drawbacks that hold back their progress are: Less interest in reading original text and English newspapers, inclination to read exam oriented notes only. They pay less attention to listening, reading and speaking skills. Our department needs 5 full time professors; But owing to the change in Govt. regulations regarding subject wise roster and total to the institution has not allowed us to fillup the remaining posts.

Opportunities:

Our students have the opportunities to be teachers, journalists, receptionists. Some of them have joined BPO jobs in different companies.

We desire to develop our students as language professionals, teachers, and journalist.

Challenges:

- 1- It is a challenge before teachers: how to focus students' attention on subject study when they are subjected to many distractions by modern pleasures. Owing to excessive role of electronic media in life, students are mostly negligent to take test exams and to prepare seminar papers. They are not consistent in their study.
- 2- Students as well as parents are exam oriented in the matter of subject study; hence, they are very selective in study. They miserably lack in the basic knowledge of the subject.
- 3- As no marks are allocated to test speaking, reading and listening skills of English language learning and as most of our students are from rural background, we face a challenges in motivating and involving them in discussion, and teach them to direct method.
- 4- We are constrained to hire services of contributory lecturers to complete the syllabus of PG classes. But they are not to be depended for they quit the job as and when they get better placement.

Strength: Being professional course, self-employment opportunity for pass out

students is 100% and they can certainly contribute to the society.

Weakness: Students are generally from mofusil area and therefore are weak at English and hence lag behind in competition with students of other colleges of

urban areas.

Opportunities: Being the only law college with full fledged faculty, grants and infrastructure, there is much scope for development in all the areas. The

department can even go for a separate autonomy.

Challenges: The challenge ahead is to prepare students to compete with the students

coming from National law school. To generate revenue from non

granted/unaided courses.

Future Plans:

To enhance research activities in the department so that department shall come to contribute to law making. The department should become one of the centers of advanced legal studies in central India. To develop infrastructure such as independent building, separate cubicles for teachers, etc.

Compliance Report

Peer Teams Report Section IV deals with Recommendation for quality Enhancement of the institute

Following were the recommendation made by the team

- Steps should be taken to increase the quality and quantity of research output.
- Faculty should be encouraged for paid consultancy.
- Alumni should actively engage themselves in the college activities.
- Drop out rate to be checked through remedial and tutorial classes.
- Keeping in view the changing job market scenario there is a need to equip students with proficiency in soft skills, information and introduction of commerce related course.
- Contributory teachers' salary needs to be reasonably increased.
- There is immediate need to appoint a qualified librarian.
- The college should have its own canteen and primary health care facilities.
- The institute should establish Anti-Ragging Cell and Women Cell needs to be activated
- Inter-disciplinary forum be formed for academic development.
- A part of library should have a corner with books, journal and informative resources for different competitive examinations.
- Instead of ATKT system compartmental / Supplementary examinations can be introduced to give a chance to students to move to the next class.

The institute has taken several actions in order to remove the shortcomings. The action taken is listed below:

• Steps should be taken to increase the quality and quantity of research output.

The college has undertaken several steps to encourage the quality and quantity of research output. RTM Nagpur University has given the status of Research Centre to five of our departments, viz. History, Political Science, Law, Textile and Clothing and Psychology. Several students have enrolled themselves at these centres for the Ph.D. programs. Sixteen out of thiry teaching staffs are already doctorates; six others have submitted their thesis and the remaining are registered for the Ph.D. programmes. Some of the thesis have been highly admired and appreciated.

• Faculty should be encouraged for paid consultancy

Some of our faculties are involved in giving consultancy to government and non-government organisation. For example, our Law department gives legal assistance to the poor and needy. English and Marathi departments are involved in giving the consultancy for preparing question papers for MPSC and the examinations that are conducted by District Collectorate office. Some of them are also involved in assessing their answer books. Our language lab has given paid consultancy to the secondary school teachers of Wardha.

• Alumni should actively engage themself in the college activities.

The Chairman of the Alumni Association is a member of IQAC so that he and the Alumni of the college are associated with the activities taking place around the year. Recently the Alumni had organised a cultural program for the delegates coming for NAAC Seminar on February 19, 2016. The Alumni has given suggestions from time to time to enhance the quality.

- Drop out rate to be checked through remedial and tutorial classes.
- 1. The Peer team had pointed out the fact that the dropout rate is quite high. Through constant and continuous efforts like tutorials and remedial coaching classes, the dropout rate has been brought down to around 7 to 8%.
- 2. Failure Rate: While examining the causes of the increase in failure rate, it has been observed that one of the prominent reasons is the ATKT facility provided by the University. The students prefer to take their examination papers in instalments rather than in one go, so as to score more marks. They don't think it advisable to go for the examination in one single attempt. There is always an apprehension in their mind that if they appear for all the papers simultaneously and get a third division their degree would be a futile exercise and hence they prefer to appear for the papers in instalments.
- 3. The college has been regularly organising regular remedial classes to facilitate the students of weaker sections. The concerned teachers identify the weaker students in the regular classes. A small group of students are selected in order to find out the problem they encounter. Relentless efforts are made to encounter the problem faced. This has resulted in bringing down the drop-out rate of the students, and the present figures of last few years clearly reveal the vertical progression the college has made.
- Keeping in view the changing job market scenario there is a need to equip students with proficiency in soft skills, information and introduction of commerce related course.
- 1. The college has also decided to conduct at least two soft skill courses annually so as to make the students computer-friendly, develop their personality and latent skills, communicative skills and instil confidence in them so as to make them look at the world positively.
- 2. The college is thinking of introducing three-week certificate program with certificates on a) communication skills b) presentation c) critical thinking d) Group discussion and interview technique. Recently the Maharashtra State government has allocated rupees 256 crores for the Wardha Development Plan wherein they are aiming at making the district as a place of tourism. The institute has decided to run a four week course on tourism so as to enable the students to join as the guides or the receptionists at such centres benefitting both the individual and the society. The curriculum aims at identifying important tourist destinations of Wardha District. The Resource persons would provide the necessary and relevant information to the students so that they become competent guides for the tourists coming to Wardha District.

• Contributory teachers' salary needs to be reasonably increased.

The Local Management Committee has decided to increase the salary of the contributory lectures by 33% from the year 2016-2017.

• There is immediate need to appoint a qualified librarian.

The institution has appointed Dr. Atul Sidurkar as a qualified librarian. He joined the institute on March 1, 2011. He is B.Sc. and has a P.G. Diploma in Commercial Computer Application. He has done his Masters in Computer Management and has passed his Bachelor of Library Science and Master of Library Science with securing Order of Merit in the Nagpur University. He has cleared both NET and SET examinations and has been awarded with a doctoral degree in the subject "Bibliometric Analysis of the Journal Pramana- Journal of Physics from January 2001 to December 2010".

• The College should have its own canteen and primary health care facilities.

The college has started its canteen in the campus in 2012 which caters to the needs of teachers and students. It provides tea, refreshment, snacks and food on demand . The college has a physician who visits the campus twice a week . The students are medically examined and diagnosed accordingly. Yeshwant Education Society has an ambulance in case of emergency. The Ambulance is kept in the college premises or in the society's office and is called for whenever/wherever required. The college has five physicians on record. Whenever required, their help is solicited. In case of emergency or chronic diseases the patients are referred to MGIMS, Sevagram and Jawaharlal Nehru Institute of Medical Sciences, Sawangi Meghe.

• The institute should establish Anti-Ragging Cell and Women Cell needs to be activated.

The institution has established Anti-ragging cell in 2011 under the chairmanship of Professor R.N. Bhalekar, Director of the Department of Physical Education. The cell aims at curbing the incidences of ragging in the college premises. Being a conventional college, generally the incidences of ragging do not take place, but precaution has been taken by forming this cell. The college had established women's cell under the chairmanship of Dr. K.S. Jadhao. Today this cell is actively involved in organising several programs for increasing women literacy and making them aware of their rights; and women empowerment. The cell also takes care of sexual harassment against the girls and women. Such incidents are reported to the Principal so as to ensure conducive atmosphere for learning.

• Inter-disciplinary forum be formed for academic development.

With the allocation of 256 crores from the Government of Maharashtra to make Wardha district a place of tourism, the college has decided to form an inter-disciplinary forum wherein three departments - Department of History, Department of Geography, Department of English - have come together to frame a four week certificate course in Tourism and Development. With Wardha developing as a tourist

centre, the centre is bound to have the requirement of receptionists and tourist guides. Hence, the college has framed the curriculum of a certificate course so as to give employment to the students and cope up with the scheme launched by Maharashtra State Government.

• A part of library should have a corner with books, journal and informative resources for different competitive examinations.

The extension of library building took place on 2012 under UGC XI plan to accommodate more stacks and books. In the extended building, library has established a corner having different books for different competitive exams. It also consists of journals and informative resources. The college library also displays information regarding competitive exams on its notice board.

• Instead of ATKT system compartmental / Supplementary examinations can be introduced to give a chance to students to move to the next class.

While examining the causes of the increase in failure rate, it has been observed that one of the prominent reasons is the ATKT facility provided by the University. The students prefer to take their examination papers in instalments rather than in one go, so as to score more marks. They don't think it advisable to go for the examination in one single attempt. There is always an apprehension in their mind that if they appear for all the papers and get a third division their degree would be a futile exercise and hence they prefer to appear for the papers in instalments. The university frames and formulates the rules of conducting and monitoring the examination system through its Ordinances. It is up to the Senate to frame the ordinance; hence the college has no say in scrapping off the ATKT system. ATKT system is like the compartmental system itself.

In Section III of the Peer Team Report the committee has pointed out

- To increase collaboration with local industries for placement and resource mobilization
- 1. To increase collaboration with local industries for placement and resource mobilization, the institute has signed three MOUs with 1.Mahatma Gandhi Institute for Rural Industries, Wardha 2. Centre for Science and villages, Dattapur 3. Pee-Vee Textile, Jam, so as to enable the students to undergo vocational training in these institutes in order to make them capable of self-employment; and if found suitable the institutes would also offer them jobs. Such vocational training can make them build up their career and go for small scale industry products which can not only benefit them financially but can also benefit the society and the government at large. Moreover Lanco Industries, Mandava as collaborated with the institute by awarding scholarship of Rs. 60,00/- to the law students.

The college will appeal to the MPs and MLAs and philanthropists to donate money so as to mobilize the resources to make the institute more and more efficient.

The college intends to run soft skill courses at least twice a year so as to develop the latent talent of the students and enhance their personalities.

In the same section under the heading institution challenges the committee has given following suggestions:-

- To empower the students from marginalized section.
- Emerging competitions from new colleges in Wardha and around.
- To improve the success rate and minimize the dropout rate.
- To increase proficiency of students in soft skills.
- To prepare for the emerging changing scenario in the education.
- 1. The college undertakes several efforts to uplift the students coming from marginalized sections.
- 2(a) The college has opened guidance cells for MPSC and Competitive Examinations under Entry in Services classes scheme and Remedial coaching classes. These cells run classes for marginalized sections of the students and motivate them to undertake the competitive exams.
- (b)There is also a cell that guides students appearing for NET/SET exams. Many of our teachers have suggested the Boards of Studies to frame the curriculum in consonance with the syllabi of NET/SET examination. Some of them have been directly involved in the framing of the syllabi. Recently two of our students passed their SET examination in English held on September 6, 2015.
- (c) Emerging competitions from new colleges in and around Wardha: There has been a mushroom growth of colleges in and around Wardha which has ultimately posed certain challenges to the institution. Students prefer to take admission adjacent to their homes. Hence, the institution has taken up several steps which would promote the quality of education. The institute being the prime institute in the faculty of Arts, Home Science and Law, the college has decided to set up its own benchmarks and parameters. The growth of students in last five years clearly indicate the efforts taken by us.
- (d) To improve the success rate and minimise dropout rate:- The success rate of the students has been on increase during the last few years barring the subject, English. The result of English in the undergraduate students appears to be low due to several reasons but then the result of our Institute is better than the University result. The success rate at post graduation level appears to be low on the account that the students want to ensure of getting minimum 55% of marks so as to qualify them for appearing in the NET/SET exams. In order to get 55% marks at PG level, they prefer to appear for subjects in instalments. The dropout rate in the undergraduate courses appears to be around 7 to 8% while in PG courses it is around 4 to 5%. The college has undertaken several steps to prepare its students for the emerging scenario in the field of education.

Apart from the recommendations cited above, the institute has taken further steps for the welfare of the students and the institute. The college has started following activities so as to help its stakeholders:

- 1. (a)The college organises initiation programme entitled "You, Me and Yeshwant". The program is conducted by the final year students to make the first year students literate and aware about the facilities provided by the college. The program is organised in the month of July so as to foster bonding between the first year and final year students. Through this program we also learn about the stakeholder's perception and concerns about the institute. This also aims at students' participation in quality process.
 - (b) The librarian takes a feedback from students about the working of the library. Steps are taken to provide conducive atmosphere to the library users. The students can lodge

complaints online and offline about the library. The Best Library User is given an annual award.

e) The college has adopted a nearby village named Karanji Bhoge which is around 10 k.m. form the campus. The students of the NSS unit often visit the place and try to identify the local problems of the village. The unit has been extremely vibrant in solving some of the problems of the villagers. The unit also organizes street plays and awareness camps like Swacha Bharat Abhiyaan. The awareness programme resulted in the increase in number of toilets in the village. Our constant and systematic endeavour shall certainly one day make it an ideal village.

Post-accreditation Initiatives

With a view to sustain and develop the quality in education, the institution has taken several post accreditation initiatives.

Infrastructure Renovation:-

- The main building of the institution was constructed nearly 60 years ago and hence, it was the need of the hour to get the building renovated. Now, the classrooms and the passages have been renovated using vetrified tiles. The POP roofing and water proofing of all the college buildings have also been done.
- A conference hall with audio-video facility has been constructed for conducting seminars and conferences.
- The library building has been extended by around 1000 sq. ft in two floors with an expenditure of Rs. 16,62,918 from the financial assistance received from U.G.C in order to accommodate more books. On the ground floor separate wash room and drinking water (RO Purified) facilities have been provided to facilitate the readers. On the first floor, E-Library has been built up which accommodates 54 computers and an interactive board. E-library is equipped with LCD projector, multemedia system, high speed internet connection and complete power backup system. The Library has been covered under C.C.T.V. Survellience. The college library is fully automated and Bar-coding of books have been done for easy retrival of information.
- The language lab with a module of 20+1 has been installed by Orel software.
- The college has also purchased a generator and an online UPS for a complete power back up.
- The college has taken the initative for constructing a new building for the faculty of law. The stone laying ceremony has taken place recently.
- A new flood light basketball ground has been constructed as per the international standard with the financial assistance of U.G.C with an expenditure of Rs, 32,78,403.
- The college premises have been covered under CCTV survellience.
- Separate cabins have been built for IQAC and Yeshwant Rao Chavan Open University Centre.
- The labs of Psychology, Food and Nutrition, Textile and Clothing and Home Economics have been renovated.
- A canteen has been opened in order to cater refereshment and meal on demand to the needy students and staff.
- The black boards in the classrooms have been replaced with interactive and white boards.
- A new washroom with an expenditure of 15 Lacs has been constructed for the girl students.
- Biometric Machine has been installed.

Academic Initative

• The teaching and non-teaching staff of the college came forward to contribute towards a corpus fund through which Yeshwant Scholarship is distributed to the meritorious

and deserving students. This scholarship is awarded to the students irrespective of caste, religion or the financial status of their parents. Several students have been benefitted by this scholarship. This also has resulted in more and better quality students.

- Seminars, Conferences and Workshops have been organized on a varity of topics by the institution.
- The institute has organized NAAC sponsorsed seminar on Academic and Administrative Audit.
- Remedial classes have been conducted for weaker sections.

Reserach Facilities

- The institute had applied for Centre for Higher Learning and Research in five subjects

 History, Political Scince, Law, Textile and Clothing and Psychology, and RTM
 Nagpur University has accorded the college the status of centre for higher learning and research in these subjects.
- The college has registered itself under NLIST programme of INFLIBNET, Ahemadabad to provide e-resourses to the students, researcher and faculties.
- 10 laptops have been given to all the Heads of the Departments of the college.
- Reliance 4G internet connection with wi-fi facility has also been provided in the campus.

Industry Interface

- The institute has signed three MOUs, two with Central Govt. institutes namely Mahatma Gandhi Institute of Rural Industries (MGIRI), Wardha and Centre for Science and Villages, Dattapur, Wardha. The third MOU has been signed with a textile mill named Pee-Vee Textiles, Jam. The central institutes have agreed to give vocational training to the students so that they can manufacture their own products whereas Pee-Vee Textiles is not only going to give training to our students but is ready to offer them employement through campus selection. Moreover they have agreed to give industrial assistance to set up our textile lab.
- Lanco Industries, Mandava had instituted a scholarship of Rs. 60,000/- to the law students.

Enviornmental Initiatives

- The college has decided to have Saturday as No-Vehicle Day considering the hazardous situation Delhi had witnessed due to emission of Nitrogne oxide, Carbon mono oxide, Sulphur dioxide, etc.
- Trees have been planted in and around the campus to provide eco-friendly atmosphere and to maintain the balance of the Eco-System.
- The college has also taken an initative of water harvesting considering the drought and water scarcity in Maharashtra. The water harvesting has been done as per the guidlines received from the Centre for Science and Villages, Wardha. The roof water is collected through the pipe which is left in a huge pit near the Bore Well.

Social Responsibility

- The college has adopted a nearby village named Karanji Bhoge which is 10 k.m. away from the campus. The NSS camps are held every year in the village. The students learn about the problems of the villagers through interface communication and attempts are made to sort out their problem.
- Recently a workshop on Seri-Culture and Beekeeping was organized by the college
 for the farmers of Wardha District so as to provide a second option for the farmers.
 Wardha District has witnessed several suicidal incidents in last few years and hence
 such an attempt would certainly help the farmers to go for this alternative occupation.
- A lecture series has been initiated in the name of our founder Chairman Late Bapuraoji Deshmukh. The lecture series is arranged on the current and burning issues related to the public.
- Considering the Swacha Bharat Abhiyan launched by the Govt. of India, the college has taken an initative to clean the campus by students and staff once in a month.
- The college has been participating in a programme named Jagar Janivancha for the last three years. This programme is meant to empower the women students by making them aware of their rights and responsibilities.
- In consonance with the National decision, the institute has decided to make the use of Khadi Clothes compulsory once in a week.

Administrative Initiative

• The planning board has been set up with a view to frame perspective plan and related policies for the development of the college.

ICT Support

- A totally new website of the college and the library has been designed with an aim to give maximum information about the institution. The website is updated every week so as to inform the stakeholders about the activities conducted in the college.
- SMS alert and MOPAC have been started.

Health Care

- The college has started a health care centre wherein a physician attends to the students twice a week.
- The Staff Club annual programme begins with a lecture on Health and Hygeine by some reputed Physician.
- The college has started celebrating Yoga Day on 21st June every year so as to make the students realize the importance of Yoga and Pranayam in their lives. Students cultivate a good habbit which can keep them Physically and mentally fit. The students are tought Yoga Asanas by the Director of Physical Education on 21st of every month.
